A giant kauri tree has been logged by the Queensland forest service and the timber sold for \$1,000. It was known as Bell's tree and yielded 17,000 superficial feet of timber in five huge logs, and the logging costs amounted to \$500. The net stumpage came to twelve feet 6 inches per 100 super feet. Had the tree been smaller a higher price would have been realized, as few saw-millers cared to handle it. This giant of the forest was offered to a timber-getter for \$30 on the stump, being at the rate of less than 20 cents per super feet, twelve years ago.
