NORTH PLATTE EVENTS THIRTY-FIVE YEARS AGO

(From the Tribune of March 7, 1885.)
Several democratic flags floated on March 4th in honor of Grover Cleveland's inauguration.

It was expected that hundreds of thousands of trees would be planted on the timber claims which had been taken. Some of the best groves now in the valley were set out that year.

The Tribune editor acknowledged the receipt of an invitation to attend the first annual ball of Platte River Lodge No. 29, Brotherhood of Railroad Brakemen to be held March 17th.

The secretary of the school board was instructed to advertise for bids for erecting a windmill and pump at the Second ward school house. A committee was appointed to secure a site for a school building in the First ward.

The Lincoln county agricultural society was organized and committees named to solicit members. T. C. Patterson and W. C. Ritner were among those who took an active part in organizing the society.

Cody's Wild West Show was exhibiting in New Orleans but not doing well financially on account of constant wet weather. Grounds which had been fitted up at a cost of several thousand dollars became a mudhole and had to be abandoned.

In those days the city council talked of paving the streets, either with asphalt or Colorado rock. The cost of either material was about the same—two dollars per yard.

Good work horses were selling around \$150 and mitch cows at \$30 to \$35.

Thirty-five years ago there were but two passenger trains each way daily through North Platte. From the east No. 1 arrived at 8:15 a. m. and No. 3 at 10:12 p. m., while No. 2 and No. 4 from the west arrived at 7:20 p. m. and 3:50 a. m., respectively. There were, however, four freight trains each way which hauled passengers.

Grandpa Keeney passed away at Hershey Thursday evening at the age of ninety-three. He was a Nebraska pioneer.

The Nichols aid society met with Mrs. F. O. Johnson last week to give her a farewell party prior to her leaving for her new home southeast of North Platte. She was presented with a beautiful dresser scarf.

Wm. Lampré and family, of the Maxwell section, have moved to his farm near Broadwater.
Gus Rosentrater, of Brady, went to Omaha last week to have an operation performed. He had a rib broken several years ago and it has since given him much trouble.

H. L. Oldfather, of Brady, left last week for IHF, Col., where he and his family will locate.

Order 100 Locomotives

The Omaha papers state that the Union Pacific has placed an order for 100 locomotives at a cost of six million dollars. Eighty will be for service on the Union Pacific, the other twenty on the Oregon Short Line. Ten of the eighty are of the Mikado model, twenty-five of the Santa Fe, five Mallets, ten of the Pacific passenger type and thirty switch engines.

Teachers' Salaries in Gothenburg

The Gothenburg school board at a meeting held last week gave teacher a substantial increase in pay.

In the grades the minimum salary has been up to this time \$800; the maximum, \$950. The new minimum will be \$1000, and the maximum \$1200. High school teachers in the past have been paid \$1200. The new minimum is \$1500; the maximum \$1600.

The salary of the superintendent has in the past been \$2000. He will receive in the future an advance of thirty per cent, or \$2600.

H. Gaudreault, of Farnam, who recently purchased the old Winquest ranch from Joe Sullivan, arrived in town Monday morning and expects to bring his herd of thoroughbred cattle over in about two weeks if the weather permits. Mr. Gaudreault is leaving a highly improved ranch, and it will be necessary for him to make about twenty thousand dollars in improvements on his newly acquired property, which will then make it one of the largest and finest stock raising farms in the state of Nebraska.
