DESERTED WOMAN SENT TO RELATIVES IN KANSAS CITY.

Mrs. Homer Munday, who was deserted by her husband ten days ago, was sent to relatives in Kansas City Wednesday by charitable people who donated her carfare and traveling expenses. Mrs. Munday and her eight months old child arrived in North Platte Tuesday evening of last week from Brady and expected to find her husband awaiting her when she arrived. He did not appear, and practically without a cent in her pocket made the depot her abiding place for forty-eight hours. Her stay at the depot awakened a suspicion with the police, and to them she told her story. Policeman Thayer took the woman and child to his home where they were cared for until provided with transportation to Kansas City.

According to the story told the police, Homer Munday is an alias for her husband whose real name is Dillon Dunbar. They were married in Kansas City March 1st, 1919. Dunbar was interested in a garage at Kansas City, was drafted and spent a year or so in service. Upon his discharge he returned to Kansas City and they were married on the above date. Soon after their marriage Dunbar and several others went to Tulsa, Okl., where they purchased a car, had it insured against theft, one of the party stole the car, and the other parties collected the insurance, this game being played several times until it got too hot for the gang and Dunbar went to Salt Lake, thence to Denver and from there to Sterling, Colo., where he stole a Dodge sedan. His wife and child joined him in Denver, and from Sterling they started east in the sedan. Some mishap occurred to the car when they reached Brady, and being almost without money, Dunbar said he would hop a freight for North Platte and that she should follow on the local. She saw her husband get on a train, and that was the last she had seen of him. She came to North Platte on the local expecting to meet him here.

The car deserted by Dunbar is still at Brady and officers are attempting to locate its owner.

Miners and Operators Indicted

Indictments charging conspiracy were returned against 125 mine operators and coal miners by a special federal grand jury in United States district court at Indianapolis late yesterday.

The charge as reported is conspiracy under the Lever act to enhance the price of necessities by restricting distribution, limiting manufacture and by other means and conspiracy to commit offenses against the United States as defined in the criminal code.

Names of those indicted will not be announced except as each defendant is served by a United States marshal with the indictment notice it was said. All the men are said to be active in the so-called central competitive field, which embraces Indiana, Illinois, Ohio and western Pennsylvania. More than one-half of the defendants are said to be mine operators.

A twenty-five per cent wage increase for bituminous coal miners is recommended in a majority report of the commission appointed by President Wilson to settle the coal strike. This report was submitted to the president yesterday. The increase absorbs the fourteen per cent granted last November, so the additional increase is but eleven per cent. Coal operators say this increase will be added to the price of coal. If so, it will probably raise the price of coal in North Platte from fifty cents to a dollar a ton.

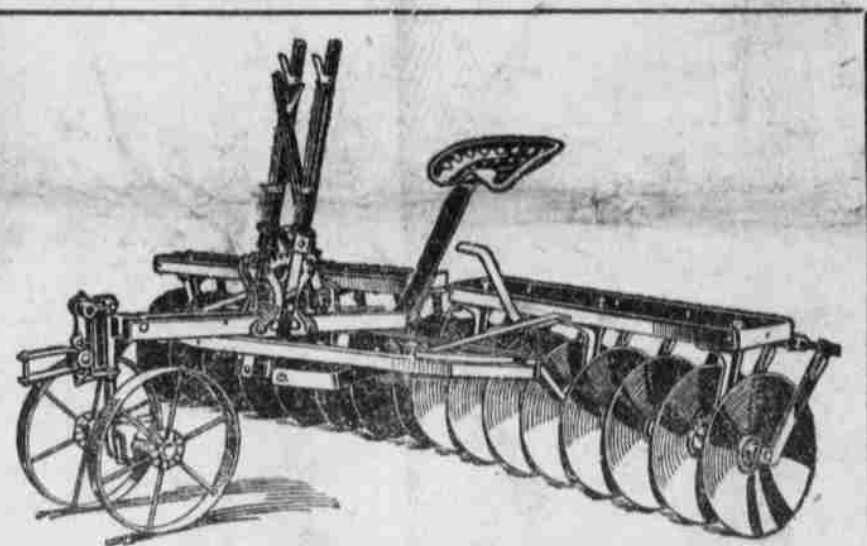
