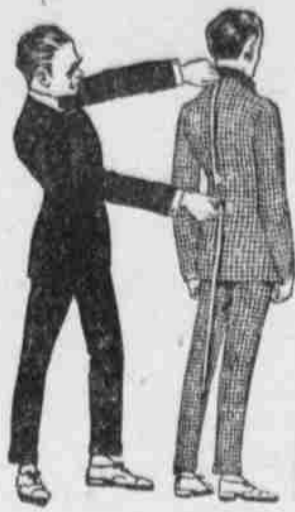

### Drainage is Essential.

In talking with Hershey men during the past week, it seems to be the general opinion in that village that a sugar factory cannot be secured until a greater acreage of beets is possible, and that the necessary acreage cannot be secured until a comprehensive system of drainage is installed. This drainage question is now in the United States supreme court, taken there by those who are opposed to the formation of a drainage district. Until that court disposes of the case, little can be done to further the proposition.

From what can be learned drainage is necessary in every section that has been under irrigation for any considerable length of time, this being necessary by reason of the seepage of water from the ditches. If drainage is essential for the increased production of beets, as well as other crops, certainly the valley farmers who are opposed to the proposition are losing money, for increased production would soon pay off the cost of the drainage system and at the same time increase the value of the land.

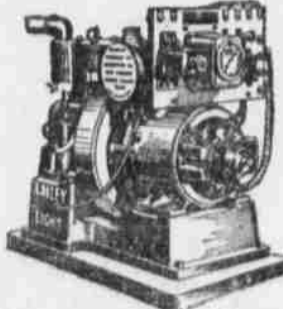

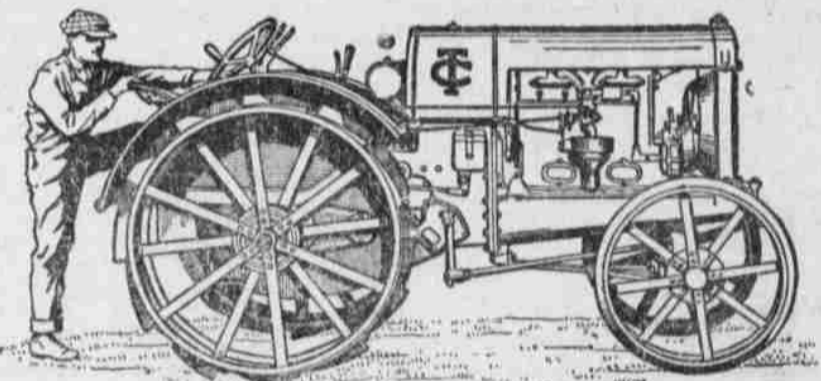

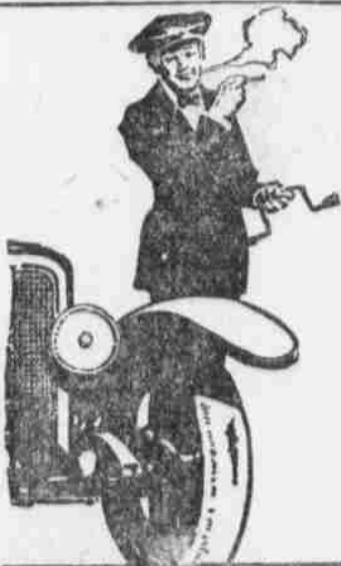
