

### BRING GOOD AND BAD LUCK

Belief in Power of Various Flowers Is Strongly Held in Eastern and Western Lands.

#### Chinese Tea Myth.

An interesting myth has been woven about the 5 o'clock "tea." According to a Chinese legend, tea was discovered by a son of an Indian king, Darma, who in 519 A. D. paid a semi-religious visit to China. To prove his

religious fervor, Darma led an austere life, ate only vegetables, and prayed constantly. He vowed never to sleep that he might devote all his time to prayer, but one day, after many years, he was overcome with drowsiness and, against his will, slept. On awakening, he wept bitterly. To show his remorse he cut off his eyelids. The next morning he found the eyelids metamorphosed into two shrubs called "cha," the Chinese for eyelids. The moral of this legend points out that Darma chewed some of the shrubbery and learned its arousing properties. In 1639, the Chinese presented the "cha" or "tea" leaves to the ear, and later they were introduced into London.

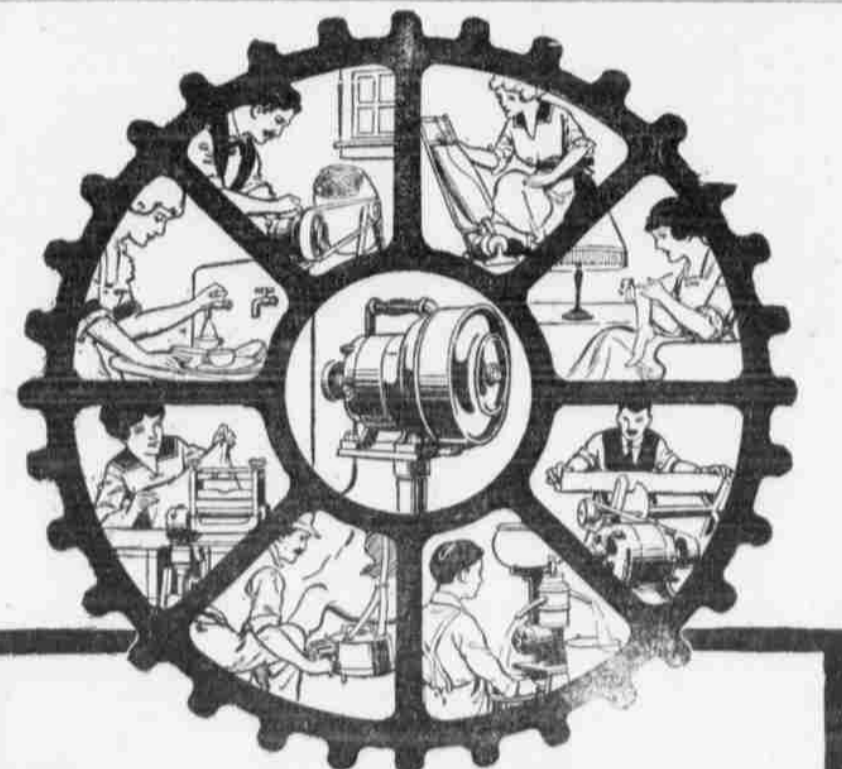
