Campaign Moves Rapidly.

The campaign for members of the Chamber of Commerce, which was inaugurated April 1st moves rapidly and satisfactorily and the two teams, the Reds and the Blacks, are vying with each other as to which can secure the greater number of new members.

Friday, and Saturday—two days before Easter—were busy days with quite a number of the two teams, and not a great amount of solliciting was done, but yesterday the campaign started in earnest and at noon the membership thermometer in the window of Secretary Moran's office indicated 160.

As the teams bring in the membership cards, the dial on the thermometer is moved, so that passers by can see just what progress is being made.

At a late meeting of Division 88, B. of L. E., a committee was appointed to arrange for the thirty-eighth annual May Party of the Division, which will be held this year on May 30, as May 1st falls on a Saturday. James McNeel was appointed chairman of the arrangement committee and he has already begun the preliminaries for this big social event with the view of having it equal those which have occurred annually for thirty-seven years past.
