
M. J. Forbes drove to Tryon Sunday with the ambulance and brought back Mrs. Stack, who will be operated upon for appendicitis at the General Hospital.

**America's Gift to France.**

France gave the Statue of Liberty to America. All France joined in the giving.

All America is joining now to give a great statue to France to commemorate the first battle of the Marne, where the soldiers of France fought six years ago and stopped the Germans.

With the Statue of Liberty, the Statue on the Marne will become one of the greatest monuments of all time, binding the friendship of two great Republics.

The cost will be approximately \$250,000, about the same sum as that expended by France on the Statue of Liberty. America's gift to France will be to France what the Statue of Liberty is to America. From people in all walks of life, from all parts of France came the money for the Statue of Liberty. Likewise, from all the people of all America should America's Gift to France be made. Small contributions from a large number of people will be more expressive of the gift than large contributions from a few. Nebraska's quota is \$3,500. Lincoln County's quota is \$65.00.

It is desired that an opportunity be given everyone to contribute and a special appeal is made to the 324,710 school children enrolled in the public and parochial schools of the state. Every one in Nebraska will be given an opportunity to share in this gift of the Nation, even though it be only a penny.

Contribution boxes will be placed in the postoffice and the banks of North Platte so that anyone wishing to contribute a small sum can do so.



| 8 tablespoons molasses           | 1/2 cup lard or butter |
| 1 lemon                          | 1/2 teaspoon salt      |
|                                  | Water                  |

Mix bread crumbs, molasses and grated rind and strained juice of lemon; spread over the pastry, and bake in hot oven thirty minutes, or until the pastry is quite cooked. Serve hot or cold.
