A quiet but impressive wedding occurred at seven o'clock yesterday morning at the Mrs. Francis McKeown home when her daughter Miss Josephine became the bride of Capt. A. V. Wortman, a member of the U. S. aviation reserve corps. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Stevens, of the Christian church, the double ring service being used. The bride was attended by her sister Miss Mildred McKeown, and the groom by E. H. Kondall, of Denver.

The bride was attired in a going away gown of blue tricotelle and carried an arm bouquet of sweet peas. Following the ceremony a wedding breakfast was served at the home, and the newly weds left at 8:15 on a western wedding trip, following which they will be at home at Hebron, Neb. The summer will be spent on a soldiers' homestead near Craig, Colo.

Mrs. Wortman is a graduate of the high school, and following her graduation accepted a position in the O'Connor store, by her efficiency she was promoted to cashier and assistant manager of the store, and as such her services were very highly appreciated by Mr. O'Connor. Capt. Wortman, at the outbreak of the war enlisted in the aviation service and for a number of months was stationed at Kelly Field, Texas, as an instructor. He still remains in the aviation reserve corps and is subject to call when his services are needed. Prior to entering the service he conducted a newspaper at Hebron, and following his term of service, resumed the management. Several years ago he was employed as local reporter for The Tribune.

F. C. COOPER, A CAR REPAIRER INSTANTLY KILLED.

F. C. Cooper, employed as a car repairer, and about thirty years of age was instantly killed at eleven o'clock Friday night when he was struck by a car pushed by a switch engine. Cooper, with other car men, was awaiting the arrival of train No. 12, and was standing on the platform. A switch engine with a car ahead came up the main line which was not noticed by Cooper and he stepped back on the track when the approaching car and engine were but a few feet distant. The switchman on the car shouted to Cooper, but his warning came too late; in fact the end of the car was so near that he could not get out of the way. He was knocked down and run over, his body being badly mutilated. The dismembered body was taken up and conveyed to the Maloney morgue.

The unfortunate had been working in the car gang about two weeks. He leaves a wife and one child.

STORM BRINGS 1.79 INCHES OF NEEDED MOISTURE.

Our annual April snow storm arrived Saturday night, continued nearly all day Sunday, and as a moisture producer was an unqualified success. Observer Shilling reporting the precipitation at one inch and seventy-nine one-hundredths. The storm started Saturday evening with a rain which continued until late at night when it turned to snow, and when the storm closed several inches of snow covered the ground.

The moisture was needed, as the top of the ground, owing the winds of two weeks, had become dry and wheat was suffering to some extent.

The storm was general throughout western Nebraska, and the fall of snow was about as heavy through to Denver as here. At Grand Island and east there was more rain and less snow.

WORK ON THE LINCOLN HIGHWAY THIS YEAR.

The Lincoln Highway from the east line of the county west to Keith county will receive considerable work this year at the expense of The state and federal aid fund. The highway from the river bridge east of town to Brady will be graded almost the entire distance, the expense to be borne by the state. From Brady to the east line of the county the highway will be put in as good a shape as possible with the funds available from the county road fund, and then next year this stretch will be turned over to the state for further improvement.

The Lincoln Highway from North Platte to Sutherland will be graded just as soon as Contractor Whelan completes his grading, and the highway from Sutherland west to the county line will be graded and put in good shape.

The highway through the county will be looked after by three road maintainers; one will have charge from the east county line to Keith, the second will look after that portion of the highway from Keith to Birdwood, and the third outfit will cover the district from Birdwood west to the county line. These maintaining outfits will include a tractor which has been furnished by the state, and the maintenance expense will be borne by the state.

STRIKE WAVING AT CHICAGO, INCREASING IN THE EAST.

This morning's papers state that while the unauthorized strike of railroad employees, which started at Chicago two weeks ago with the walk out of 700 switchmen, appeared to be gradually waning in the west and southwest, the conditions east of Cleveland took on a more serious aspect. The receipts at the Chicago stockyards yesterday were heavier than any day last week, which is taken as an indication that conditions on roads entering Chicago are improving. About 25,000 men at the Chicago packing plants are still idle.
