I am, as you know, a member of the State Board of Agriculture, and I am intensely interested in the welfare of the agricultural and stock interests of Nebraska. **HOAGLAND FOR SENATOR.**

April 14th, 1920.

**TO THE VOTERS OF THE 25th SENATORIAL DISTRICT:**

My attention has just been called to an eleventh hour attack being made on me by the Non-partisan League thru the columns of the North Platte Telegraph. Scurrilous attacks upon reputable citizens do not ordinarily call for attention. I have lived in this community from boyhood and by honorable upright methods have attained my present position. My past record against dishonest corporate control is clear. I never have attacked and never will attempt to interfere with legitimate business, whether it be handled by a corporation or a private individual. If every person who has invested his earnings in a company is dishonest, then I plead guilty of belonging to that class.

While I am president of the Higgins Packing Company, it is a farmer's organization in which 90% of the stock is owned by Nebraska farmers and stock men and 11 of the 15 members of the board of directors are actual farmers. It is an independent farmers' co-operative concern for the purpose of protecting the farmers' interests. I was induced to accept the position of President to assist in making it a success. Last winter, when our Senate Committee was investigating my bill to regulate the stock yards and packing houses, the question of my pressing such a bill while an officer in a packing company, was raised and I told the Senate Committee that this was an honest independent company and we were willing to be regulated, and we wanted the trust organizations regulated.

I am on the board of directors of the Fidelity Reserve Company, a North Platte Mutual Life Insurance Institution. There are no stock holders, and all dividends go to the policy holders and all moneys are invested in Western Nebraska instead of being sent to New York. The farmers and business men who are policy holders are the people benefited by my efforts.  
I am now working on a plan for the organization of a public improvement district for the development of water power on the Birdwood Creek. It is planned to issue bonds upon the District, construct the power plant, and have the people own the plant and thus furnish electric power to our citizens at cost. In North Platte we are paying more than twice as much for electric power as the people of Omaha pay for the same service. This prevents manufacturing enterprises from coming here. If the people themselves will build this power plant, under the law which I framed we will be able to get electric power for less than 3 cents per kilo watt where we are now paying 12 cents, and we can get electricity for manufacturing purposes for less than 1 cent per kilo watt.

In the last legislature I fully supported the farmers program. I wrote the amendment in the Senate that permitted the farmers to have a seat on the Omaha Grain Exchange. I

This bill was passed in the Senate but defeated in the House. I introduced and urged the passage of bills to license and regulate stock yards and packing houses.

I have served the people at a heavy loss in time and money and have done so because many of the people felt that I was in a position to accomplish something for this district.
