## MEET TO DISCUSS THE DRAINAGE PROPOSITION.

Members of the city council, directors of the Chamber of Commerce and other citizens met last evening to discuss a drainage proposition that would result in taking care of the water which flows from the west through the city both north and south of the railroad tracks. The solution of this water problem seems to be the construction of a drainage ditch west of the second Cody Addition running north under the railroad track and emptying into the irrigation ditch at a point west of the cemetery. The south end of the ditch would be at a point on a parallel with a continuation of A street. The cost of the ditch would not be less than \$15,000 to which would need be added the purchase of right-of-way.

A ditch for a similar purpose was constructed a number of years ago and seemed to serve the purpose during flood times, but as these floods did not occur each year the ditch was not taken care of and eventually drifted full of sand and the company filed in the culvert which had been placed under the track.

Whether this ditch will lower the water level and tend to keep out the inflow of water into basements is a debatable one, some insisting that it will, others that it will not. It would seem probable that if this flood water from the west is kept from flowing through the street ditches, a portion of which undoubtedly sinks into the ground, it would have some effect on the water level.

## RAIL STRIKE SITUATION IS MATERIALLY IMPROVED.

Chicago is entering the third week of the switchmen's strike, with the situation considerably improved. Railroad officials state that fifty per cent of the strikers were back at their posts yesterday morning and that the strike has lost all its effectiveness in the past forty-eight hours.

There has been a substantial increase in the movement of both freight and passenger trains since Saturday and within a short time all of the rolling stock tied up for weeks is expected to be in use again. Volunteer workers have been called off the job as the strikers are returning and no further trouble is anticipated in moving freight.

Heavier shipments of live stock have been received at Chicago yesterday than in many weeks past and it is believed that butchering will resume normal proportions within the next few days. The embargo on cattle shipments has been lifted.

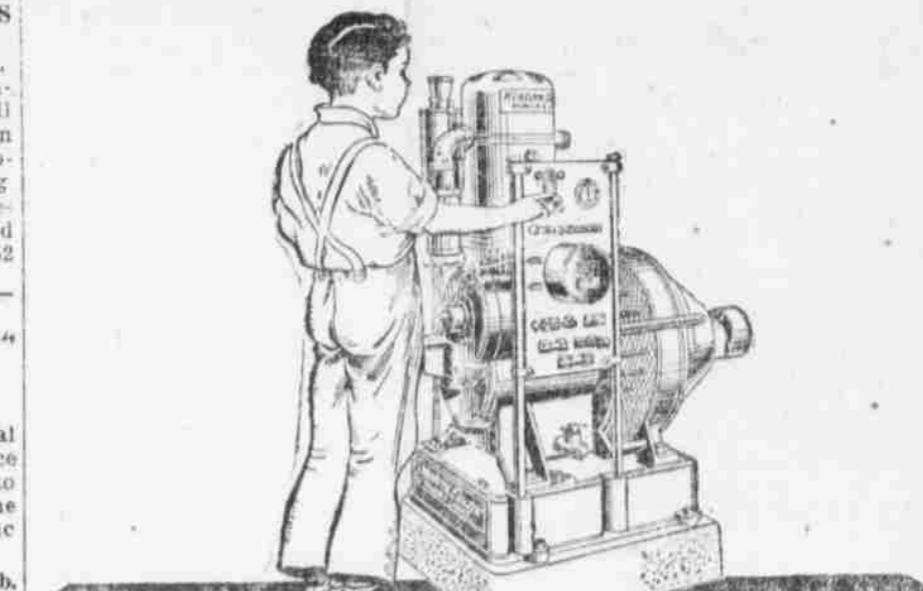
