**EAST FOURTH STREET
PAVING DISTRICT FORMED.**

At a meeting of the city council, held Tuesday evening an ordinance was unanimously passed creating a paving district commencing at the east city limits on Fourth street thence west nine blocks on Fourth street to Pine street, thence north two blocks toward the depot to Sixth street, where it will connect with the paving already done.

This action of the council was taken upon the petition of thirty of the property owners upon these streets. There are fifty-five owners of real estate upon this street in the proposed district, so that a large majority have signed the petition. The only thing now that can prevent the paving of this district will be a remonstrance which must be signed by a majority of the property owners and filed within twenty days. It will be impossible to secure a majority of the property owners upon a remonstrance unless a considerable number of those who signed the petition should withdraw therefrom and sign the remonstrance instead. This is not likely.

It was just a year ago when the residents of this district petitioned the council to include this territory in paving district with the district which it was sought to pave on West Fourth street. This was their undoing, because the opposition on West Fourth street was so strong that the whole project was killed by the remonstrance. The people on east Fourth street profited by their experience of a year ago, and this time insisted that they should have a paving district all to themselves. This will not prohibit other paving districts being formed and contracts being let for the different paving districts at the same time.

The Tribune believes that this is the opening wedge for paving a fair portion of the streets of North Platte at an early date. Certainly, if other cities such as Lexington, Broken Bow, Crete, Shelton, York, Madison and dozens of others can pave at this time, North Platte should not remain longer in the mud. The property owners on east Fourth street have shown a progressive spirit and the Tribune wishes to congratulate them upon their action. So that there may be no doubt as to what citizens are boosting North Platte and those that are knocking, the Tribune publishes below the names of the signers of this petition, and if a remonstrance to this paving district is filed, the same will also be published in The Tribune with the names of those signing the same. The Tribune feels that it is no more than fair that the people of this city should know the names of those who are working to make North Platte an up-to-date city and those who are trying to hold it back. The law requires that the council shall advertise for bids upon different kinds and characters of material, and after the bids have been received, shall hold same without taking any action, for 30 days; then a majority of the property owners may determine the kind of paving desired and certify their wishes in this regard, by written statement to the council, and the council will thereupon be obligated to let the contract for the kind of material designated by a majority of the property owners.

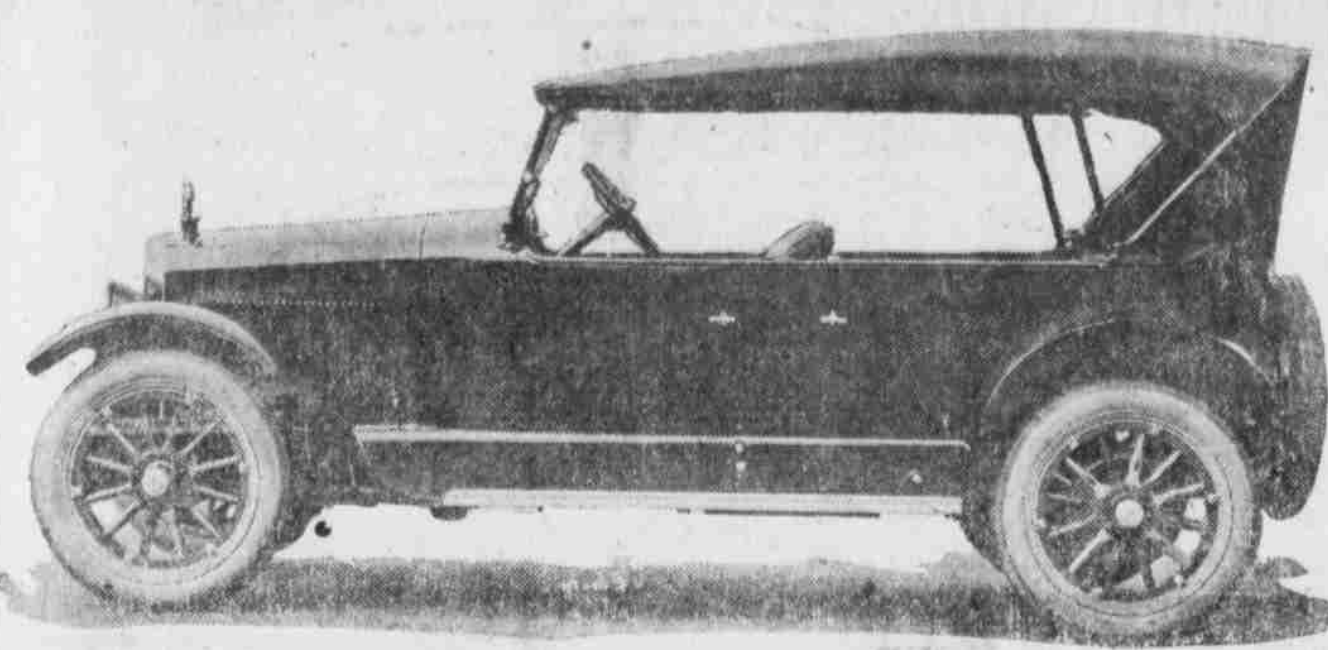

ORDINANCE NO. 112.

An Ordinance Regulating the Operation of Public Dances within the City of North Platte, Nebraska, and Providing for License Thereof.

Be it Ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of North

Platte:

SECTION 1. LICENSE: That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation, within the city of North Platte, to engage in the operation of, or conducting of a public dance or dances, without first having secured from the Board of Public Welfare of the City of North Platte, Nebraska, a special permit therefor, which said permit shall designate the party securing the same, the time for which the same shall be in effect, and the place where said dance or dances, are to be held.

SECTION 2. RULES: That all public dances held in the city of North Platte, Nebraska, shall be held and conducted, under and in accordance with the following rules and regulations as prescribed by the Board of Public Welfare of said City, and such shall hereafter, from time to time, be prescribed:

a. All places used for dancing must be brightly lighted during all the time they are in use, and no so-called “Shadow Dances,” “Moonlight,” “Flood or Colored Light” Dances are to be permitted. All stairways and other passages and all rooms connected with dance halls must be kept accessible and well lighted.

b. The gentleman's hand must be placed lightly, not over half way around the lady, and above the waist line. The lady is merely to rest her right hand in her partner's hand and her left hand to rest lightly on her

partner's arm or shoulder. The touching of heads is positively prohibited.

c. All unnecessary shoulder or body motion or shimmy prohibited.

d. No minor children under the age of 16 years shall frequent, remain in, or patronize dances unless accompanied by their parent or legal guardian.

e. All dances which come under the supervision of the Board of Public Welfare must close not later than 12:30 A. M., unless given special permission in writing by the Mayor of the City of North Platte.

SECTION 3. Every person, firm or corporation engaged in, or conducting a public dance within the city of North Platte, must secure and post in a conspicuous place, within said dance hall a copy of this ordinance.

SECTION 4. PENALTY: Any person, firm or corporation who shall be found guilty of violating any provision or provisions of this ordinance or who shall fail to comply therein, shall upon conviction thereof, suffer the cancellation of their permit and be fined in any sum not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$100.00 and stand committed until such fine and costs are paid.

SECTION 5. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication, as required by law.

ORDINANCE NO. 113.

An Ordinance providing for the paving of certain streets within the City of North Platte, Nebraska, and for the creation of Paving District No. 3 of said City.

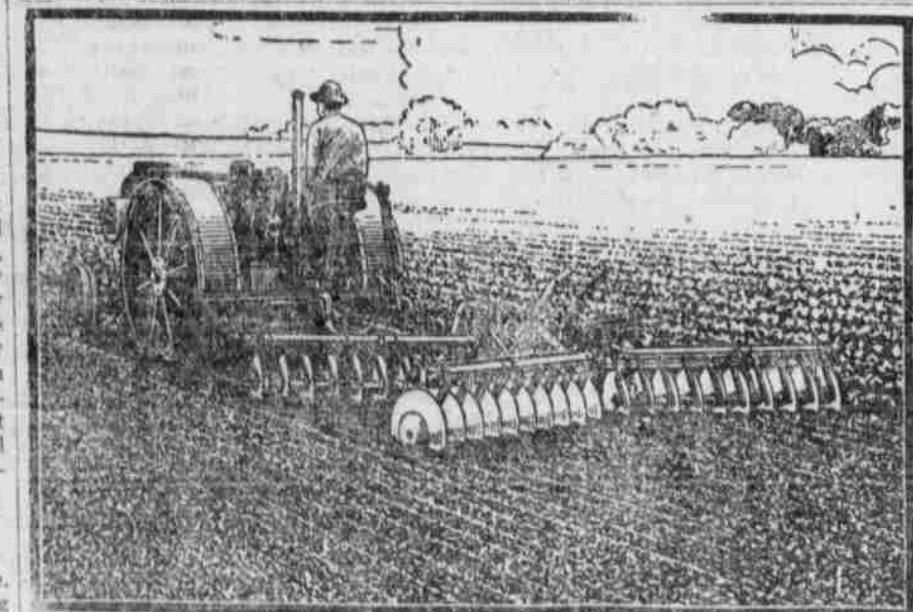
Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of North Platte, Nebraska:

Section 1. That the following streets including the intersections thereof, within the limits of the City of North Platte, Nebraska, be paved, to-wit:

All of that portion of Fourth Street of said City, commencing at the intersection of Fourth Street and Bryan Avenue in Riverdale Addition to said City, thence west along said Fourth Street to and including Pine Street of said City, thence north along said Pine Street to the South line of Sixth Street of said City, as it intersects said Pine Street of said City.

Section 2. That all of the streets described in Section 1 of this ordinance shall be and constitute Paving District No. 3 of the City of North Platte, Nebraska, and said Paving District No. 3 of said City is hereby created.
