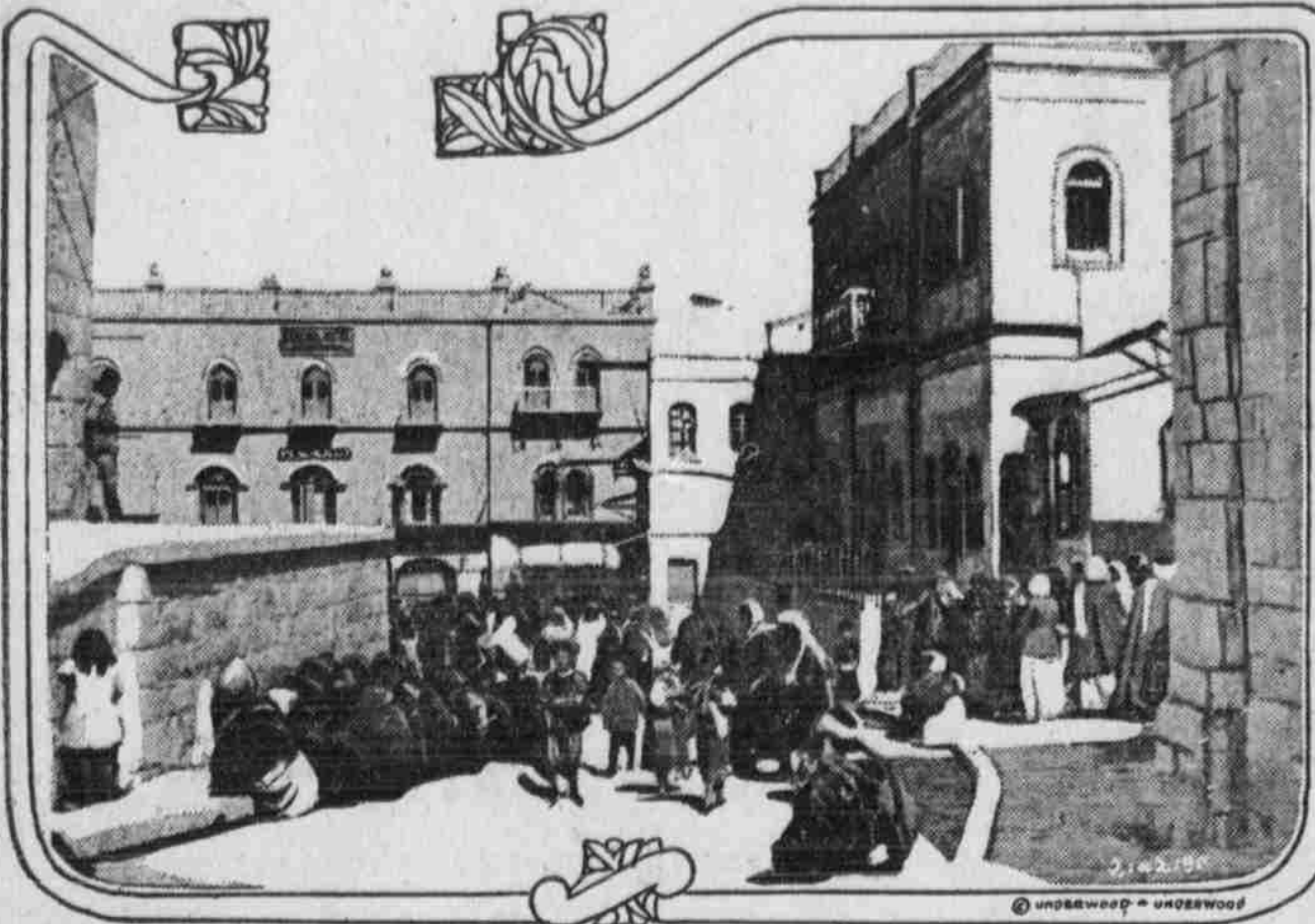


## DESTITUTE SEEKING RELIEF IN JERUSALEM



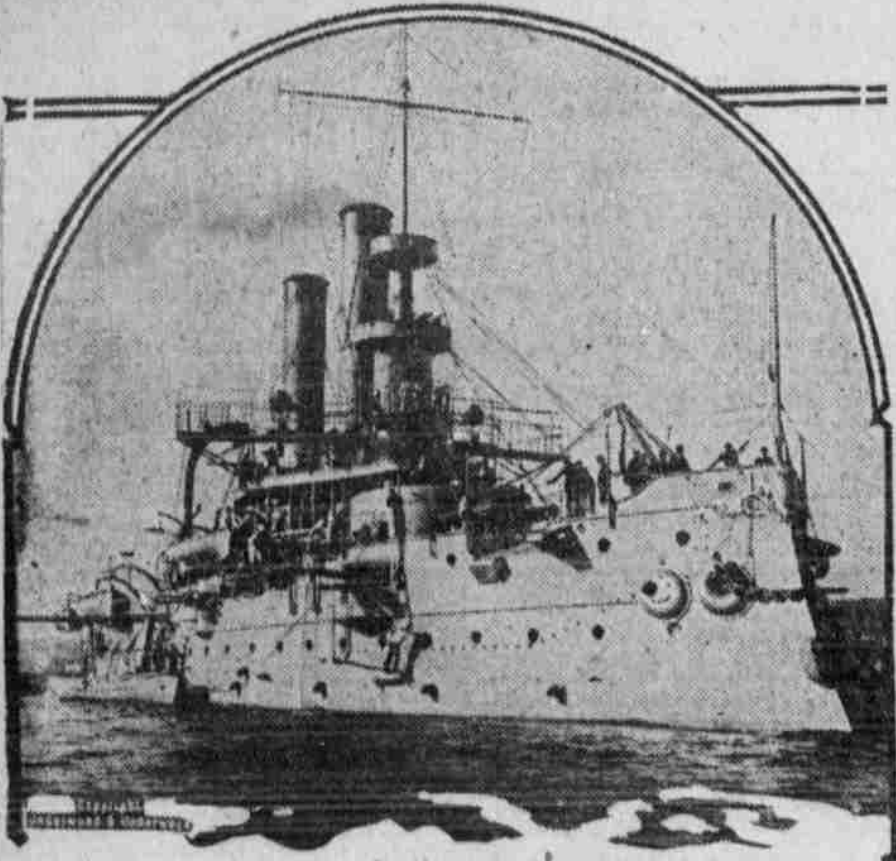

## HONORS FAMOUS SERGEANT



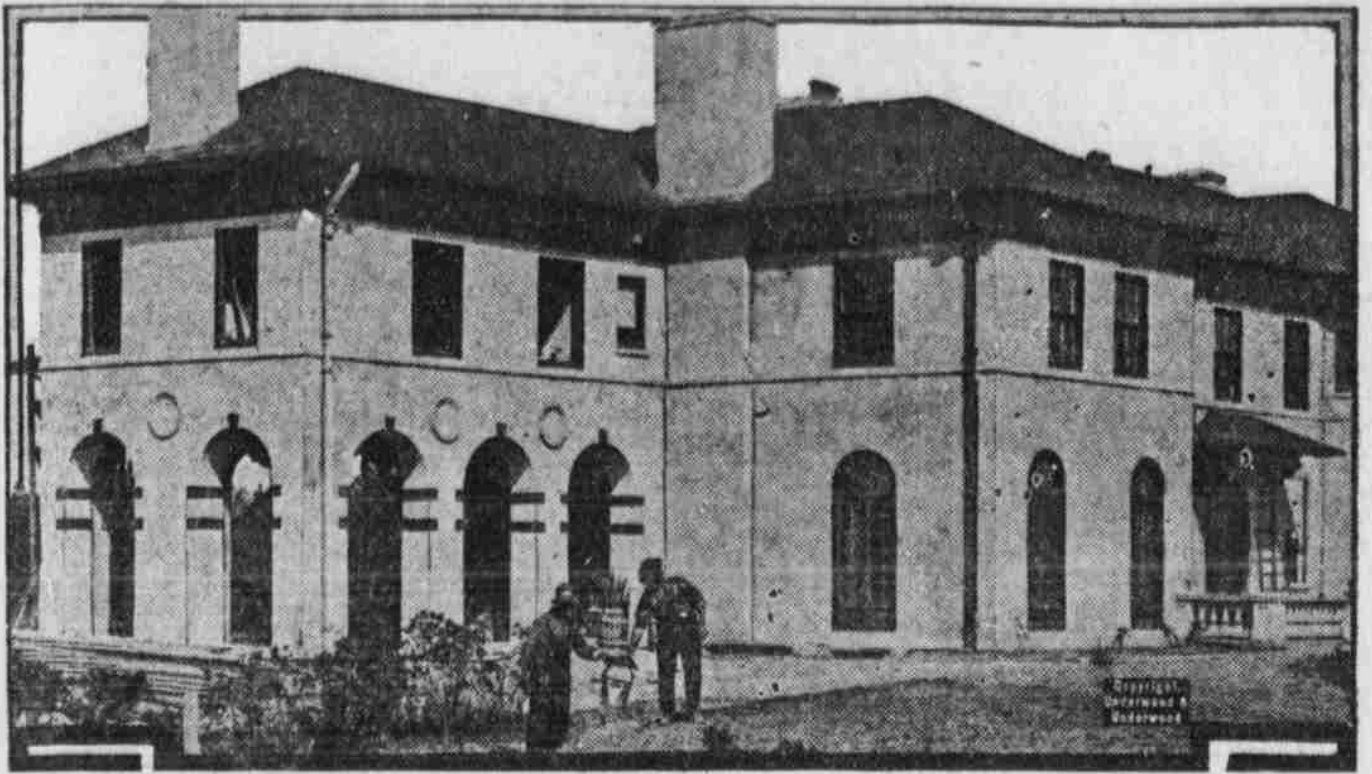

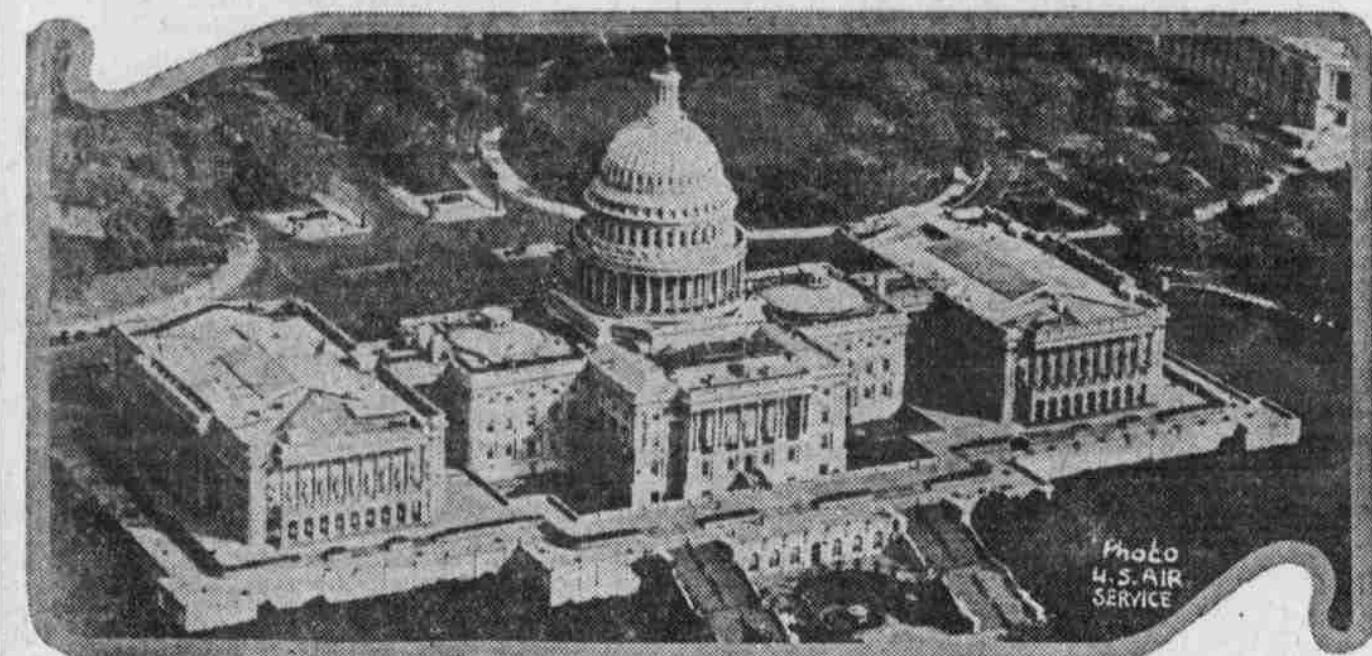
Swedish delegate to the international peace conference, who has recently been appointed arbitrator in the Franco-American court at Paris.

## WOULD SAVE HISTORIC HOME OF MARK TWAIN



Historic home of Mark Twain at Hartford, Conn., one of the oldest residences in New England, to save which a nation-wide movement has been started, interesting such bodies as the Chicago Art Institute and many others. Announcement of the destruction of the building, in which was written "Innocents Abroad" and other stories, has resulted in offers of financial aid from all over the country, the Hartford Art society announces, but it is said that the present owners, who bought the property for \$55,000 a few months ago, are demanding \$300,000 for it. The state park commission has been asked to condemn the property for a state park to avoid paying this price.

## FRENCH TOWNS SELL BREAD TO POOR



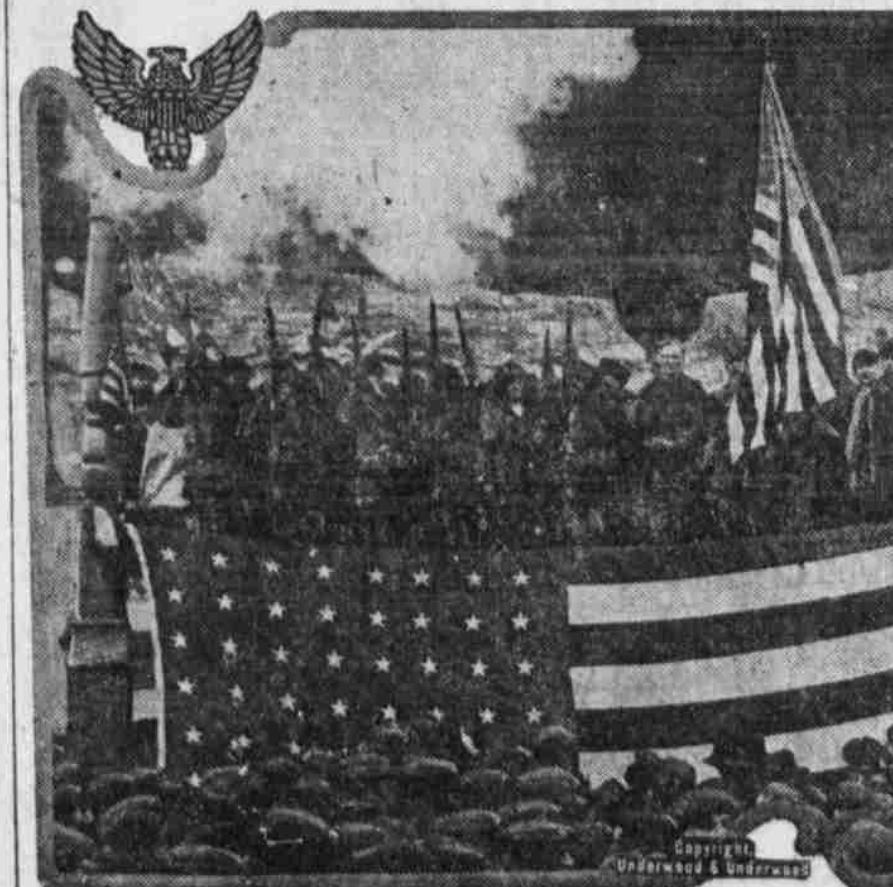

Nergis Avagian, the fifteen-year-old Armenian girl, who arrived recently at New York. She was the only one of 20 Armenians at Zara, Turkey, who was spared. She was then only twelve years old and was kept prisoner for two years, when she was forced to marry one of her captors, and was tattooed on the face to show that she had become a Mohammedan. She was found by her brother at Savas, Turkey, after she had escaped from her captors, and he brought her back to this country.
