EVENTS IN NORTH PLATTE THIRTY-FIVE YEARS AGO

(From The Tribune May 2, 1885.)
The annual May Party of the B. of L. E. was held at the Lloyd skating rink with 120 couples on the floor and 200 spectators in the gallery. Music was furnished by the Twenty-first Regiment band, then stationed at Sidney.

Ike Watts, now of Corning Ia., was thrown from a horse and had his face badly cut and his body bruised.
The Jackson and the Ormsby grocery stores were burglarized but the only articles taken was a caddy of tobacco from each place.

The population of Ogallala at this time was 700 and it was one of the best towns in the west part of the state.

The Hinman House served a midnight supper to seventy-five couples who attended the May Party. In those days the restaurants and hotels served midnight suppers when all night dances were held.

Two hundred girls bound for Utah to become wives of Mormons passed through on a special train.

E. S. Wiggins sold his interest in the Conway & Wiggins hardware store to Scott Keith.

An offer of twelve hundred dollars was made for the lot north of where the Ideal bakery now stands, but the owner, Gus Meyer, asked \$1300. That lot, if now vacant would sell for ten times that sum.

The city schools had a holiday May 1st and teachers and pupils held a picnic on the banks of the North Platte river near the railroad bridge.

T. J. Foley advertised that his double store was lighted by five incandescent electric lights, and that his business was established in 1869.

Picture Prices go up but this has not stopped the Sun Theatre from presenting North Platte with one of the biggest pictures of the season, "The Virgin of Stamboul" played by Priscilla Dean. Three days commencing to-day. This picture opened in Lincoln last month to one of the largest crowds in the history of the town. Two shows in the afternoon and two at night.
