### 100 APPLICANTS FOR CITY SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT.

Mrs. Harry Cramer, secretary of the board of education, informs us that she has on file about one hundred applications for superintendent of the city schools, made vacant by the decision of Supt. Tout not to re-apply. These applicants are scattered all over the country, one living as far north as Canada, another as far south as Florida. This can be taken as evidence that North Platte is a muchly advertised town, and is known throughout the entire nation.

The board will hold a meeting within the next few days and sift out applicants who may appear not to possess the necessary qualifications and then from the remainder make a selection. It is probable that in order to secure a superintendent that meets the requirement a higher salary must be paid than was given Supt. Tout.
