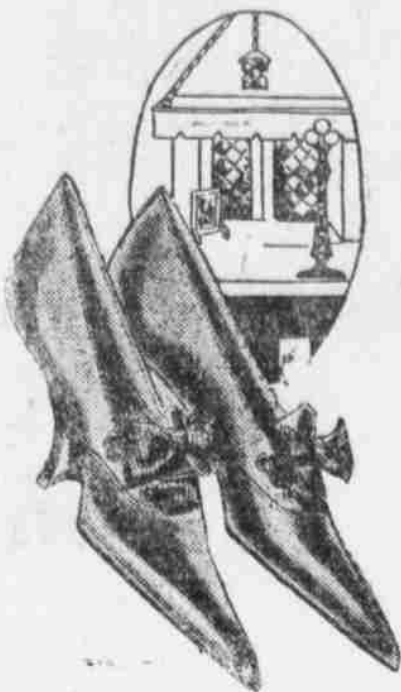

Events leading up to commencement are: Senior assembly May 7th, May 13th picnic at Dick's grove, May 21st class play at the Keltz Theatre, May 22 junior-senior banquet and May 23rd baccalaureate sermon by Rev. Koch at the Lutheran church.

Wm. Thayer Weds Mrs. Huxoll.
Wm. Thayer and Mrs. Ella Huxoll were united in marriage Tuesday evening at the Lutheran parsonage by Rev. C. F. Koch, and following the ceremony left for Denver on a wedding trip. The bride was attended by Miss Helen Minshall and the groom by A. A. Hutchkiss.

They will live in a home in the southwest part of town which Mr. Thayer is having remodeled—the former Mrs. Bengs house which he recently purchased and has moved to a lot he owned.
The bride is well and favorably known, having spent her life in North Platte. The groom is in the service of the Union Pacific as an engineer.

Will Advance Water Rates.
It is probable that the council will elevate the water rates, making a minimum charge of twelve dollars a year. Cost of operation of the plant has increased to such an extent that an advance in rates is necessary to keep the plant from going too far in "the hole." While everything else has advanced in price, the water rates have remained unchanged, but conditions have now reached a point when the advance must be made.

Harry Waltemath Breaks Arm.
Word received yesterday announced that Harry Waltemath, who is attending the Wisconsin State University at Madison, had broken his right arm at the elbow. Ringing Bros. circus wintners at Madison, and the students were donated a lot of material which they were to use in giving a "circus" during commencement. Among the property donated was a horse which stumbled and fell while Harry was riding it and in the fall he sustained the fractured arm.

Will Reorganize Fire Department.
In line with a suggestion made by Mayor Streitz at a previous meeting, the city council Wednesday passed a motion that the fire department be reorganized and increased in strength and efficiency. The present membership is at its lowest point, and efforts will be made to build it up to about minimum strength. Additional hose will be purchased, as will also boots, coats and other equipment for the members.

Will Clean Sewers.
The council has made arrangements to have a demonstration of a turbine machine for cleaning sewers. The company offers to come here and clean out a thousand feet of sewer free of charge, hoping to sell the city a machine at a cost of about fifteen hundred dollars. It is probable that at least part of our system is pretty well clogged with grease and sticky substances and if the mains were cleaned we would not be troubled so much with sewer water backing up into basements, as is frequently the case in the business section.

Investigate Camp Site.
On Tuesday afternoon nine members of the Boy Scout Council made a trip to the Roberts' pasture, about two miles north of Sioux Lookout, for the purpose of investigating a camp site for the Boy Scouts and Campfire Girls. It now seems certain that one of two sites in that neighborhood will be selected. A small stream runs through the tract and both have considerable heavy timber, with sufficient open space to make an ideal camp ground. Of course, the establishing of this camp will depend upon the support given these movements by the citizens of North Platte, but from the sentiment which has already been expressed by the various organizations of the city, it would seem that a permanent camp is assured. Plans are being matured for putting on a financial campaign May 17th to 19th to raise \$5,000 for camp and equipment for the Boy Scouts and Camp Fire Girls.

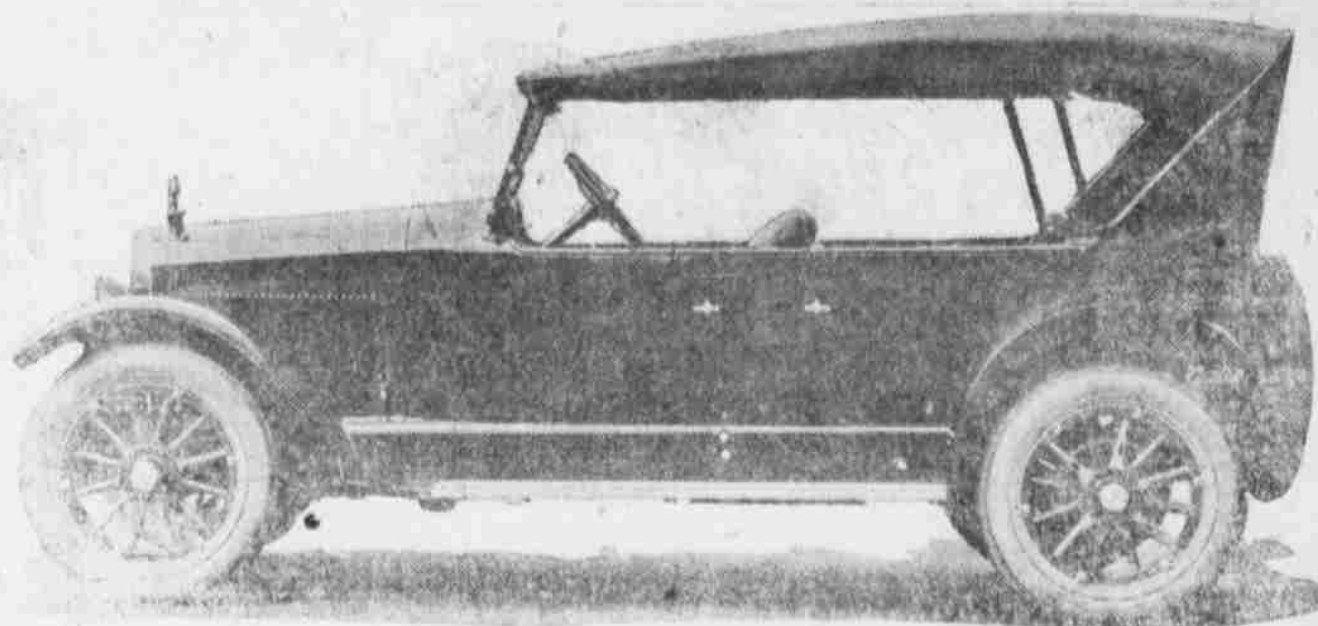
Community Chorus Concert.

Propose Drilling for Oil.
J. R. White and Fred Pierson, of Sutherland, were visitors in town Tuesday, the object being to get North Platte men interested in a company to be organized for the purpose of drilling for oil near Sutherland. An expert oil man, one who has had much experience in the oil fields of the west, recently visited Sutherland, and after making an investigation gave out an opinion that the geological formation in the Sutherland section would indicate the presence of oil. Upon this report an attempt is being made to form a company and put down a test well.

So many men in North Platte have dropped money on oil and mining ventures that they are somewhat cautious about further expenditures along that line, and we learn that Messrs. White and Pierson succeeded in interesting only a few of our residents.
