CLEAN-UP CAMPAIGN WILL START NEXT MONDAY.

General Chairman Sebastian, of the Clean-up Campaign, requests The Tribune to announce that the campaign will begin Monday of next week. It was the intention to have started this campaign a month ago, but it was delayed by reason of so much wet weather. Since then many residents have cleaned the alleys and their premises but there are still left a number of unsightly back yards and vacant lots and to these the campaign committee will direct its attention. This is a movement in which all those who are interested in a clean and pretty town should heartily join.

LOCAL STOCKHOLDERS DEMAND INVESTIGATION BY STATE.

About fifty stockholders of the Skinner Corporations, of Omaha, gathered in North Platte yesterday afternoon to discuss the situation and take action to protect their interests. These stockholders came from Keith, Frontier and Lincoln counties. An organization was formed with George White, of Sutherland, as president, John Murphy, of North Platte, as secretary and James S. Shoup of Sutherland, as treasurer. A report was made by Atty. Wm. E. Shuman of his investigation of the corporations and resolutions were unanimously passed reading as follows:

"BE IT RESOLVED, that the stockholders of the Skinner Corporations, of Lincoln, Keith and Frontier counties, gathered together in a called meeting held in North Platte, on May 10, 1920, call upon the officials of the State of Nebraska, and particularly the Blue Sky Department of said state, to conduct a full and complete investigation of the books, affairs and transactions of the Skinner Corporations of Omaha, and to furnish to the above stockholders organization a report of such investigation and particularly showing therein to what extent funds of said corporation have been mis-appropriated or wrongfully used, to whom paid, and upon what excuse, and what shares of said corporation have been issued without consideration or for insufficient consideration, the numbers and amounts thereof, to whom the same were issued and for what purpose, and in fact showing in full all wrongful appropriations and issuances of stock."

After the State of Nebraska has completed its investigation another meeting of the stockholders will be held. There was represented at this meeting more than 1000 shares of stock in these corporations.
