Woman's Benefit Association of the Maculenes To Have Big Time At Western District Rally To Be Here May 25th, 1920.

A very welcome visitor from Michigan to the State of Nebraska is Miss Frances D. Partridge, Supreme Record Keeper of the Woman's Benefit Association, who will be the guest of W. B. A. members at various points during the week of May 24th.
Miss Partridge will hold large meetings at North Platte and Omaha and all arrangements have been in charge of Mrs. Agnes Temple Boyer, State Commander.
Miss Partridge is one of the few women of this country, whose talents have permitted her to branch out as a pioneer in practical actuarial work for the largest fraternal grouping of women in the world. Her fitness for the important position she now holds was the means of unanimously electing her to her office in 1911, which is the second highest within the gift of this Woman's Association to give.
Miss Partridge is a very interesting woman for, apart from her special work as an actuary, and her supervision of trust funds amounting to over Thirteen Million Dollars, her literary attainments are unusual both as a writer and literateur. Miss Partridge will give addresses at all the meetings arranged for her and her headquarters will be the McCabe Hotel while in this city, May 24th and 25th.

ORDINANCE NO. 115.
An ordinance providing for the paving of certain streets within the city of North Platte, Nebraska, and for the creation of Paving District No. 4, of said city.
Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of North Platte, Nebraska:
Sec. 1. That the following streets including the intersection thereof, within the limits of the City of North Platte, Nebraska, be paved, to-wit: All that portion of Fifth Street of said City, commencing on the east line of Vine Street in said City, at the intersection of Vine and Fifth streets, then west along said Fifth Street to the east line of Adams street in said City, as it intersects said Fifth street.
Sec. 2. That all of the streets and intersections thereof, as described in Section 1 of this ordinance shall be, and constitute paving District No. 4, of the City of North Platte, Nebraska, and said Paving District No. 4, of said City is hereby created.
Sec. 3. That this ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication, as required by law.
Passed and approved this 18th day of May, 1920.
