TOMORROW WILL BE A BIG DAY IN NORTH PLATTE.

The nation's natal day will be celebrated in North Platte tomorrow, and it is probable that the city will be called upon to entertain the largest number of people in its history. For the entertainment of the expected visitors a full day program of amusements has been prepared, the big feature of which will of course be the afternoon auto races. These, however, will not constitute all the amusement, for the day's program will start at 9:30 and there will be something doing all the time until the midnight hour.

The first event of the day will be the big parade, which is scheduled to start from Third and Dewey streets at half past nine o'clock. In this parade will be two bands, City and Chamber of Commerce officials, the American Legion, Spanish War Veterans and G. A. R., Camp Fire Girls, decorated floats and autos, farm floats, fire department, road and shop men and school children. There promises to be an unusually large number of business and lodge floats and decorated autos and for the best decorated vehicle liberal prizes are offered.

Following the parade there will be exercises at the court house park, and later the races will be held there.

Commencing at 12 o'clock and continuing until 1:30 bomb salutes will be given at the fair grounds, and at one o'clock sharp the North Platte Aerial Company will put on its airplane stunts at the fair grounds. These will consist of tail spins, loop the loop, parachute drops and other acts of daring.

Then will come the big auto races, which promise to be the best North Platte has ever witnessed.

At 7:30 there will be a band concert at the court house park, at eight there will be a wrestling match at the arena at the corner of Sixth and Locust and during the evening there will be dancing at the pavilion at the corner of Front and Dewey and also at the K. C. hall.

The fireworks display will be held on the B. & M. right-of-way on South Dewey street and will commence at 9:30.

KING RHILEY HEADS LIST IN ELIMINATION RACE.

The elimination contests preparatory to the big auto races tomorrow afternoon were held on the track yesterday afternoon before a big crowd of spectators. Each driver was sent once around the half mile track. The time made was as follows, the number preceding the name indicating the number the driver will hold in the race:

1. King Rhiley, 32 2-5 seconds.
2. J. O. Morgan, 34 seconds.
3. C. A. Drake, 34 3-5 seconds.
4. A. Prettner, 35 seconds.
5. H. S. Roller, 35 1-5 seconds.
6. Davis Auto Co., 35 1-5 seconds.
7. G. J. Schrader, 35 2-5 seconds.
8. Harry Bradencamp, 36 seconds.

The above eight drivers will compete in the one mile track record, in the three heats of the North Platte Special, and the four money winners of the North Platte Special will be the contestants in the Chamber of Commerce Sweepstake, which will be for twenty-five miles and for which the big purse has been hung up. To the winner of this race will also go the big loving cup offered as a trophy by the Chamber of Commerce.

The time of the other four drivers in the elimination race was:

The above four drivers will be the drivers in the two heats of the Lincoln County Special Race.
