**MILLION DOLLAR ARTIFICIAL ICE PLANT.**  
 The Pacific Fruit Express Co. is building a giant Artificial Ice Plant at the west end of the Railroad yards. The tower for running the concrete is in place and is one hundred eighteen feet high. Work on the wooden forms for the walls has begun and with the arrival of a supply of cement the actual work of running the walls will begin. This building will be 370 feet long, 120 feet wide and 53 feet high at the highest point. It will have a capacity of about 250 tons of artificial ice a day. Fifty-five cars can be loaded from the platform which will extend along both sides. The plant is being built by the P. F. E. Company and is a part of their general policy of preparing to handle a larger production of western fruit. With the closing of the wine industry in California the grape crop is thrown onto the market as perishable fruit and it must be transported to eastern states in refrigerator cars. Giant artificial ice plants are to be built all along the Harriman system from San Francisco to Chicago. The increase in the production of cantaloupes and grapes will require 3,000 more cars which have been ordered by the P. F. E. Co. The customary ice harvest this winter will be omitted if the new plant can be made ready in time. Officials of the construction department look for the concrete work to be completed in about four months. The entire walls and roof will be of concrete. The entire cost when ready for use is estimated at \$1,200,000.
