Chautauqua Dates Are Announced.

FINE ARRAY OF TALENT.

Six Days of Entertainment Promised by the Committee.

The dates for the 1920 Chautauqua at North Platte are August 16-21 inclusive. The list of talent as announced is one of the best that has been presented to us for many years. The opening program will be given by the Lindsay-Frost Company, who give an entire afternoon of sketches, trios, solos and readings. The same company gives a prelude in the evening with Ned Woodman, cartoonist, as the main attraction.

The Spanish Girl's Orchestra, which was here on a winter Lyceum Course several years ago, will give the program on the afternoon of the second day. They have the Spanish costumes and songs and give a novel entertainment. Mrs. A. C. Zehner follows the Spanish Girls prelude in the evening with a lecture on "Forces that Help or Hinder the Progress of a Nation." On the third day we have the Cheney Concert Company in a full afternoon program and prelude in the evening. They play the beautiful White House Golden Organ Chimes besides a number of other instruments.

The next day is band day. Jaroslav Cmera, the noted trombone player and his Czecho-Slovak Band will give two full programs. This is the great day of the Chautauqua in the music line.

On the afternoon of the fifth day the Lyric Male Quartet will give a concert. These boys are full of good music, humorous songs and readings. In the evening Gregory Mason will lecture.

The grand climax of the week will come on Saturday when Dr. Paul W. Ivey, business specialist and community expert will give his lecture on "Heart of a Nation" in the afternoon and in the evening the Wales Chautauqua Players will give the popular three-act comedy "Rejuvenation."

Detailed information about each program will be available later.

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WAR DEPARTMENT GRANTS ROAD.

Following is a clipping from the Bee which will be of interest to those living in the eastern part of the County: Washington, July 21.—(Special Telegram.)—Secretary Baker late this afternoon signed an order granting permission to the board of county commissioners of Lincoln county for a 66-foot right-of-way across the Fort McPherson military reservation in that county. This action was taken as a result of a personal interest shown in the matter by Judge Kinkaid who reviewed the case, which had its beginning in 1907, but for some unaccountable reason was permitted to lie dormant until the county clerk of Lincoln County called on the Sixth district congressmen to help boost it along.

The Lincoln county commissioners want to construct a road across the reservation to be erected and maintained at the cost of the county. Formal application was made to the War Department in 1907 for this enactment, but nothing came of the application until today. All the land in the original Fort McPherson reservation (approximately 19,500 acres) excepting the small area reserved for a national cemetery, was transferred to the Department of the Interior by the War Department in 1887, and the War Department, therefore, had no interest in any land except that contained within the excepted area. But as the roadway contemplated is to pass through the reservation held by the War Department it was necessary to get a formal order from the secretary of war to build the road under the direction of the Lincoln county commissioners.

Another Booster Trip.

The Committee appointed by the Chamber of Commerce Directors to consider another Booster Trip has issued the following statement to the business men of the city:

"Our Booster trip west was such a success in every way and the impressions left in towns west and north of North Platte was such as to influence us to consider the same kind of a trip east to Kearney and north to Stapleton and return. The people on the Stapleton Branch especially are wondering why we have shown so much attention to the river towns when they to the north are our good friends and customers. The Committee would like to know the sentiment of the business men toward this proposition. The Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce would like to hear from every business man. Call him up. Trade extension is what we are all after and the Committee thinks that the more we go after it the more business we will get. Call him up."
