**FIRST CONTRACT TO TEACH NORTH PLATTE CITY SCHOOLS.**

Articles of agreement made and entered into on this 18th day of December, A. D. 1918, by and between Miss Mary E. Hubbard, of the Town of North Platte, Lincoln County, State of Nebraska and C. P. Hall, the Director, Edward Morin, the Moderator and S. M. Baker the Treasurer of School District Number One (1) of the County of Lincoln, State of Nebraska, witnesseth: that for and in consideration of the sums of money hereinafter enumerated and stated, the said Miss Mary E. Hubbard agrees to teach the school of the said District for the period of three (3) months commencing and dating from the Thirty-first day of November, A. D. 1918, and ending on the Twenty-eighth day of February, A. D. 1919 and to perform all her duties as such Teacher of the said District faithfully and in compliance with the Law for, and during the period of time hereinbefore mentioned. In consideration of the said services as such Teacher of the said District the said C. P. Hall, Edward Morin, and S. M. Baker, the aforesaid Officers of the said School District, bind the said District and agree to pay the said Miss Mary E. Hubbard the sum of One Hundred Dollars per month for each month which she shall teach the school out of the Treasury of the said School District.

"The novel in question is harmless, and the people who brought about that poor publisher's conviction were as silly as—as well as it reminds me of a story.

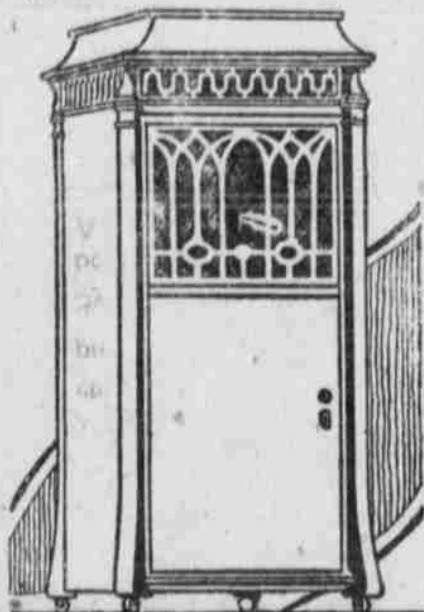
