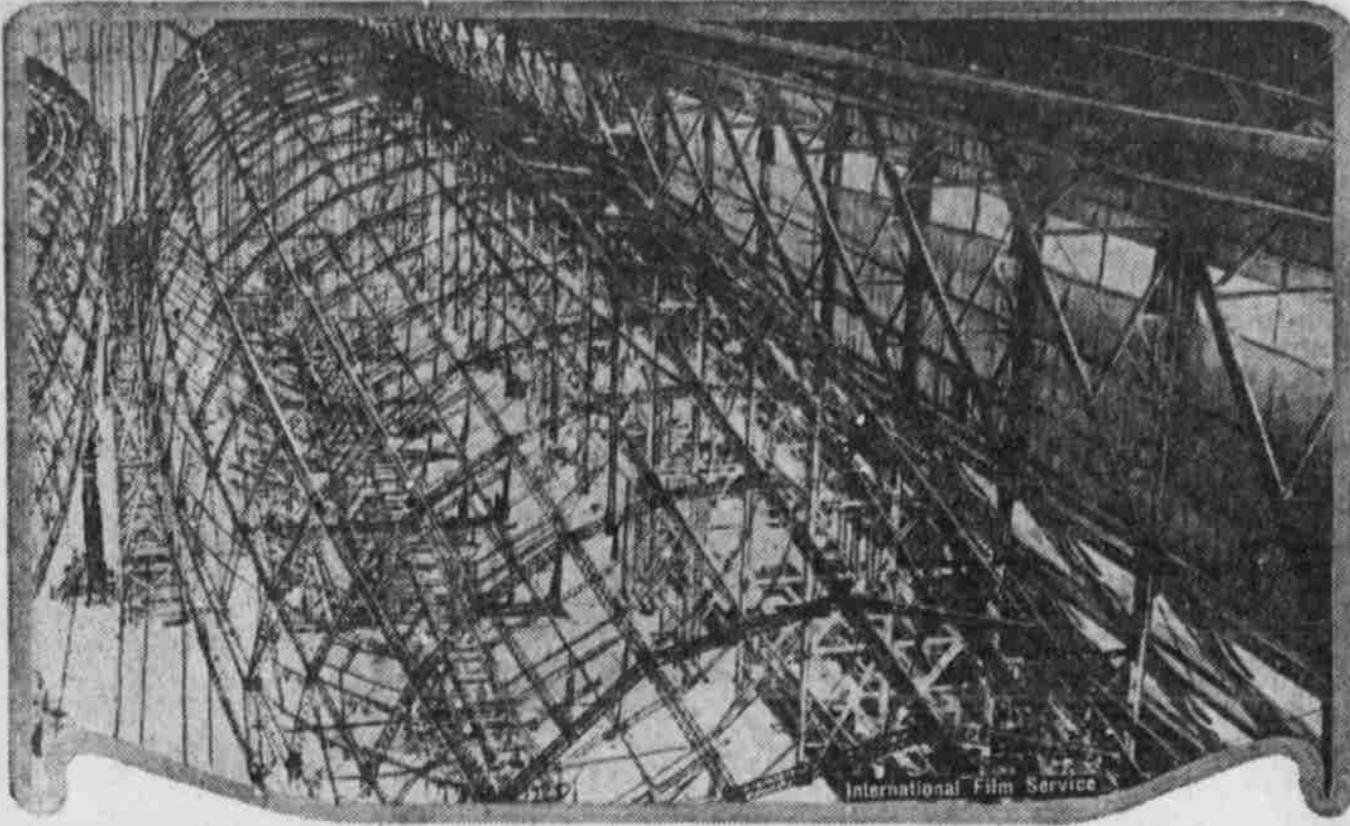


Building Giant Airship for United States

Picked Boy Scouts Go to England



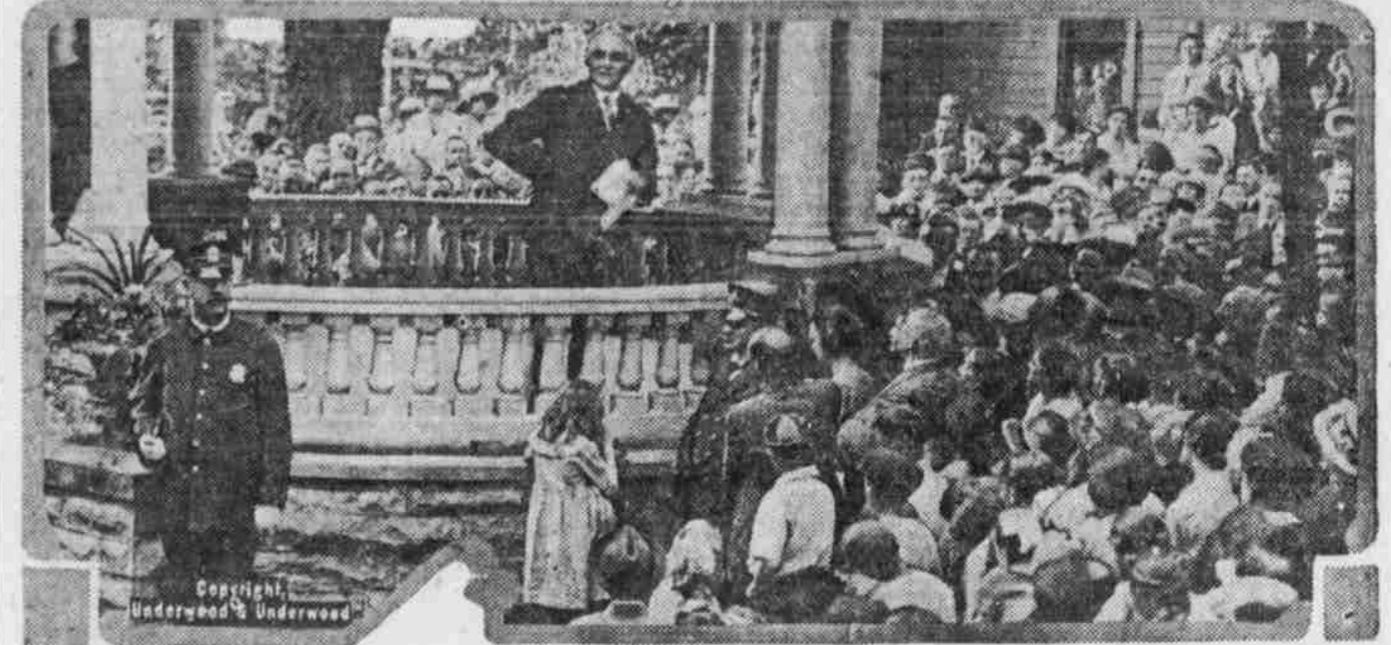

Lloyd George in Strange Company



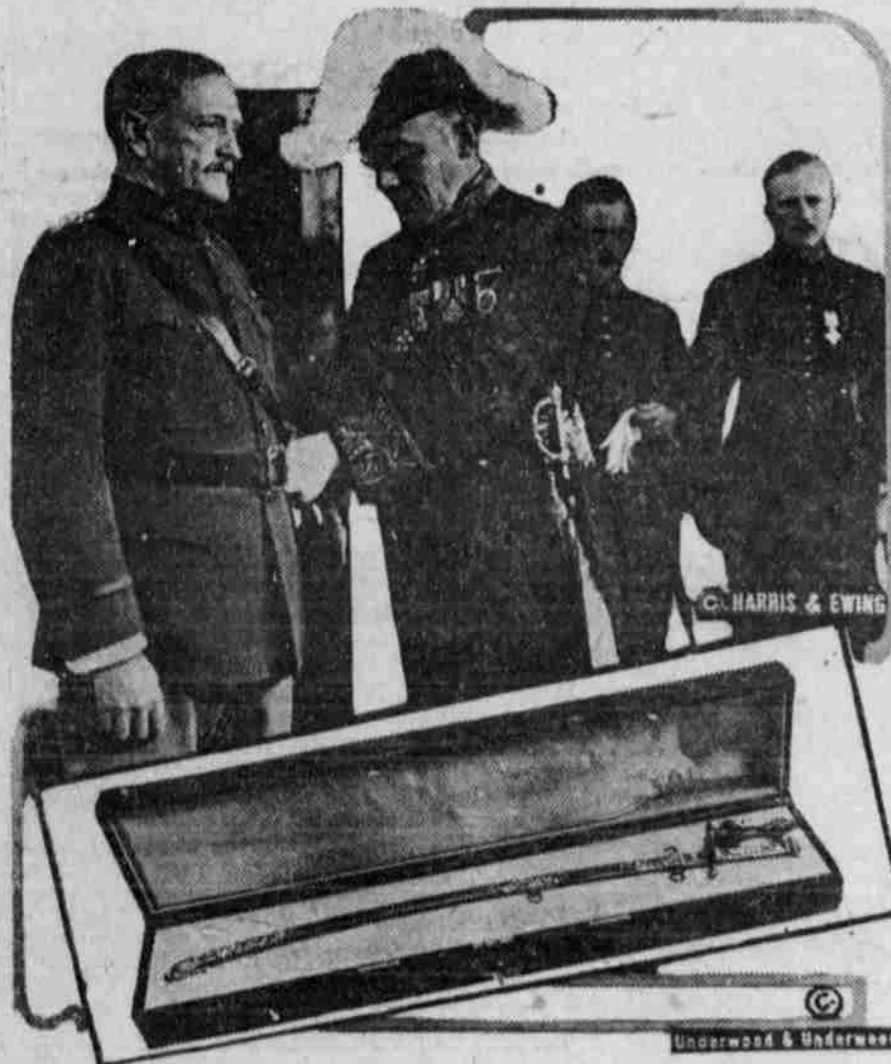
