A card from Dr. Drost says he is on his way to New York City to he will transact business but that on his way he will stopover at points in West Virginia.

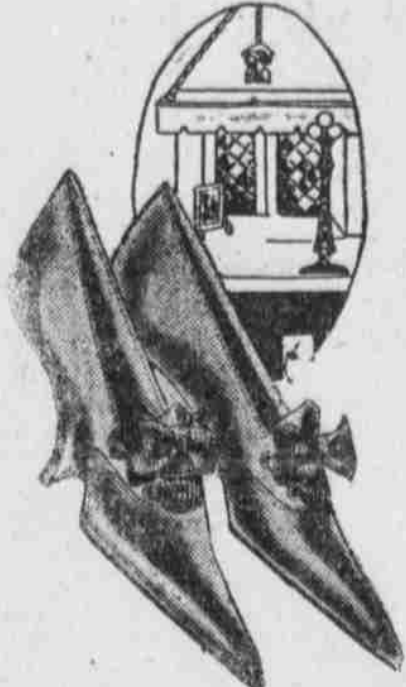
J. Vernon Lunsford has purchased the property at 615 E. 2nd Street and will remodel it, making a modern home and will reside there in the near future.

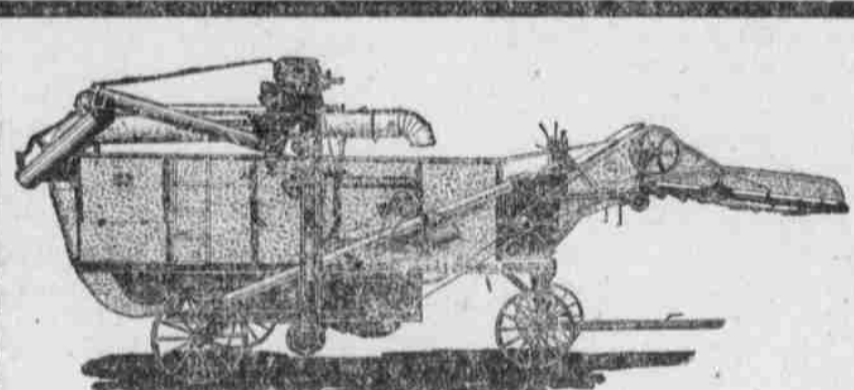
