NEBRASKA STATE FAIR.

Officially opening the Fifty Second Nebraska State Fair, a coterie of speed demons, attracted from all parts of the United States by the heavy horses hung up for fast driving, will attempt to lower present track records and thresh out a few disputes between themselves as to the leaders in the gasoline world. When they nose the radiators of their half score of cars to the starting line on the afternoon of September 6, while they wait for the flag that starts the big events, everything indicates the start of one of the fastest afternoons of sport ever witnessed in this section.

Chief among the drivers who rank high in the speed world and who will pilot their cars about the Lincoln oval will be Sig Hugdahl, present world's dirt track champion; Fred Horey, former world's champion who will attempt to regain the honors taken from him by the little Scandinvian; Burr Lampkin, British speed star who is adding laurels of this country to those he has established in the old world; Ray Claypool, who though a youngster is grayhaired, indicative of the tenseness of the sport; Dave Koetzla, holder of the world's hour record, and others. Time trials, match races, three cornered fights and a long distance grid are on the program and entries have assured all of these. In addition to the other prizes offered, there is a special purse to the driver making the fastest mile in the time trials, and for the breaking of the present track records.

With promises that the Lincoln track, known as one of the best dirt ovals in the middle west, will be in tip top shape for the speed battles, present records, not only of the track but of the section, are due for a fall when this array of kings in the world of speed go thundering about the track.

NORTH PLATTE OR OGALLALA!

The following clipping from a recent issue of the Omaha Bee is of interest to North Platte, and Lincoln County readers:

Hayes Center, Neb., Aug. 22.—(Special.)—The railroad from Culbertson via Hayes Center to North Platte or Ogallala now appears to be assured. C. A. Ready of this place who is promoting the road, says plans are completed for the organization of the company, and it will be definitely settled within the next two weeks whether the terminal on the Union Pacific will be at North Platte or at Ogallala. The survey will be made as soon as that is determined.

Farmers along the line are eager for the work to commence, as they see in the early construction of the road the only means of getting their large wheat and corn crop to market. A portion of the 1919 wheat crop and much of the corn crop is yet in the farmers' hands, owing to the inability of the present railroad facilities to move it.
