## CITY SCHOOLS TO OPEN.

**SUPERINTENDENT LITTEL ANNOUNCES PLANS FOR THE OPENING OF SCHOOL.**

On account of the Labor Day celebration the opening of the City Schools has been postponed until Tuesday, Sept. 7th. This was done by action of the Board of Education. For weeks the school buildings have been in the hands of carpenters, tanners, plasterers, painters and cleaners getting them into shape for the opening of the new term. Four new cottage schools have been built and equipped ready for the opening day. Most of the other buildings have been redecorated so that it will be an almost new looking school plant that will receive the boys and girls as they start the new term.

Superintendent Littell announces a general meeting of all teachers in the City Schools for Saturday afternoon at three o'clock in the Franklin Auditorium. At that time somewhat detailed plans for the first days will be taken up by the Superintendent and the principals. Every teacher is expected to be here at that time and take part in the conference. Superintendent Littell has had a ready response to the request for rooms and will have on file in his office a list from which teachers may make a selection.

While there will be no school on Monday, the teachers will not be idle. There will be opportunity for registration of pupils in the Senior and Junior High Schools on Monday but no registrations will take place in the Ward schools until Tuesday morning. Following is the schedule of registrations for Monday in the Senior High School: Twelfth grade from nine to twelve, eleventh grade from one p. m. until five. On Tuesday morning at eight o'clock the Tenth grade will start to register and continue until eleven.

Following is the schedule for the Junior High School registration which will be held in room 210, next the Principal's office on the second floor: Because the classes in Junior High School are too large for the assembly room in which registration is to be held, each class will be divided according to the letter of the alphabet with which the names begin.

Those pupils of the 9th grade whose surnames begin with letters from A to L inclusive will register at 8 o'clock a. m. Monday, Sept. 6th.

Those pupils of the 9th grade whose surnames begin with letters from M to Z inclusive will register at 10 a. m. Monday, Sept. 6th.

Those pupils of the 8th grade whose surnames begin with letters from A to L inclusive will register at 1 p. m. Monday, Sept. 6th.

Those pupils of the 8th grade whose surnames begin with letters from M to Z inclusive will register at 3 p. m. Monday Sept. 6th.

Those pupils of the 7th grade whose names begin with letters from A to L inclusive will register at 8 a. m. Tuesday, Sept. 7th.

Those pupils of the 7th grade whose surnames begin with letters from M to Z inclusive will register at 10 a. m. Tuesday, Sept. 7th.

**ALL CITIZENS ASKED TO SET ASIDE THEIR DAILY TASKS AND CELEBRATE.**

The North Platte Central Labor Union through its President, Chas. L. Smith, invites one and all to attend the picnic at the City Park and Fair Grounds next Monday. Plenty of fun and amusement has been provided and everyone is urged to come out and enjoy it. The celebration opens with a parade which will form at 9:30 a. m. at Front and Locust Streets.
