SEBASTIAN WRITES ON LANDING FIELD

Editor North Platte Tribune, North Platte, Nebr.

Dear Mr. Tout:

In my mind the coming of the Aerial Mall, putting North Platte as one of the ten Government stops between New York and Frisco, means a great future to our town.

You perhaps know that the North Platte Chamber of Commerce, through its Board of Directors, assured the Government thru Mr. Danphy, that North Platte would provide a field and a hangar. A lease has been secured for a term of five years. The hangar is to be built by subscription. Committees have been appointed and to say the least they have had very good success. Up to date a quota has been allotted to each firm, business and professional man, and the quota in each case is the minimum amount, which, if it is given by each person, will be enough to erect and equip the hangar as well as pay the lease for one year. The cost of the hangar will be a direct cost this year without cost next year, as the Government will pay the maintenance expense.

Aviation is where the automobile was fifteen years ago and it will advance much faster. So it is up to the North Platte people to secure funds and start the erection of the hangar this week or we will lose out. If the business people pay the quota allotted them by the committee it will be 100% sure. If not, we will be obliged to pass up the opportunity offered our city as well as putting our Chamber of Commerce in a bad position. Where do the good people of North Platte stand? This is a chance of a life time. Thirty-six months more on your present age will be amazing to you to see the rapid advance made in aviation.

The route from New York to Frisco will be a Government Trunk line. We will see aeroplanes coming from the East, West, North and South daily and using our proposed air field. We will see lots of aeroplane passengers going from coast to coast stopping on our field before we are twenty-four months older. In short, space will not permit me to say more but as a citizen and a chairman of the organizing committee I sincerely feel the cause a worthy one and one that we will feel hurt about later if we do not support it with our subscriptions and influence.

Over fifteen of our leading business men have spent two weeks of their valuable time working to make the present presentation possible. Therefore, it will go across with the proper support and without this support it will fall. We must respond this week or we will lose.
