**AGRICULTURAL EXPERT STUDIES CROPS WEST OF HERE.**

L. L. Zook, of the Dry Land Department of the Experimental Substation, returned last week from a fifteen-day trip through Western Nebraska and Eastern Wyoming. Leaving North Platte on the Lincoln Highway, he went to Sidney, then across country by way of Bridgeport to Mitchell. The work at Mitchell deals primarily with irrigation experiments, dry land experiments being secondary. Considerable work was being done along the North Platte Valley Highway which is to extend from Bridgeport to North Platte. From Mitchell Mr. Zook drove to Ardmore, S. D., where he visited the fossil beds at Agate. Work has been in progress here for the past fifteen years and it is estimated that there is enough work here in excavation of fossils to last one hundred years more. The district surrounding Ardmore is principally devoted to cattle raising. From here he drove through Edgemont and Lusk to Torrington, Wyoming. The crops in that section are some what backward but look good. The estimated yield of beets at Scottsbluff for the surrounding district is 10.6 tons an acre. He came down the valley on his way home and took note of the farming conditions which prevail west of this city.
