FOOT BALL DAYS HERE

THE SEASON OPENS THIS WEEK WITH GAME HERE.

The North Platte High School foot ball team is again before the people of the city asking for their attention during the next few weeks.

With Keith Neville as head coach, the team is making a good showing and prospects are bright for the state championship. Nine of last year's players are out again this year and enough new material is on hand to give confidence to the student body that everything will come out well. Adams (Capt.), Locke, Hoga, Overman, McFarland, Hinman, Walters, Yost and Simon are the old players while Horn, Shaner, Bunnell, Cornwell and a bunch of new fellows will be ready to take the places away from the old men if they don't make good.

The schedule comprises nine games, four at home and five away. The home are Alliance, Oct. 1st, Gothenburg Nov. 5th, Curtis Nov. 19 and Grand Island Nov. 25. Away from home the boys play Lincoln, Lexington, Cozad, Kearney and Scottsbluff. Season tickets for the home games are two dollars each for adults and \$1.50 each for High School. A special ticket for children will be sold at seventy-five cents. These tickets are sold by the High School pupils and at some of the Drug Stores.

The schedule is a good one, the coach and team are up to the high standard of N. P. H. S. Now the question of finance is to be worked out and the people are asked to support the football by purchasing liberally of the season tickets, thus placing the sport on its feet financially.

ANNUAL MEETING OF LUTHERAN CHURCH HELD LAST EVENING.

The annual congregational meeting of the Lutheran Church at North Platte was held last evening in the church. The ladies served a dinner to the members and families at seven o'clock. About one hundred were present. Reports from the different departments of the church were read and plans made for the coming year. One report showed the largest number of accessions since dedication of the church, that has been recorded in its history. There were fifty-seven new members. Another report showed that over \$10,000 has been collected for the current expenses and benevolences of the church during the year and this does not count any of the funds raised for the church building. The reports all emphasized the good work being done by Rev. C. F. Koch, the pastor, and the entire membership. With the close of the best year in its history the First Lutheran Church of North Platte turns its face toward the new year with a united front and an excellent outlook.

STATE FARM BUILDS SILO

INFORMATION AS TO THE COST OF BUILDING SATISFACTORY PIT SILO.

A new silo has just been built at the State Experimental Substation, which is interesting as it presents the exact figures for the cost and the methods used in filling it. The silo is thirty by twelve feet. A concrete collar was put down to the depth of three feet, the remainder of the distance being plastered. It required three men one day to dig the collar and pour the cement. Five men and one horse worked three and one-half days to complete the digging of the silo. The total cost of the silo was \$175. The rated capacity is 58 1/2 tons. The actual tonnage put into the silo was 43 tons which lacked three feet of filling it. This would make three dollars the cost per ton to build the silo.

Pigs were used for a short time to pack the silage, one man to drive the pigs and one man to handle the shoot as the silage came down. While the pigs proved a success at packing, they soon got tired and went on a strike so the man had to finish the job.

W. R. MALONEY RETURNS FROM TRIP THROUGH THE EAST.

W. R. Maloney returned Friday from an extended trip through the east. He joined the special train of Embalmers at Chicago and was one of the party of about 275 who journeyed from Chicago through the chief points of interest in the east to Springfield, Mass., where the National Convention was held. He spent some time in New York, representing the Nebraska Embalmers at the Funeral Directors Council. Mr. Maloney is confident that conditions are gradually moving toward the normal. Every where he found business men confident that as soon as the election is over, business will be as good as usual and in some lines there will be an improvement. "The financial situation is improving and showing more strength," said Mr. Maloney, "and with the big crops and price reductions in some lines we can expect reasonably good business conditions over the whole country this fall."

GOVERNOR COX SPEAKS HERE

DEMOCRATIC CANDIDATE FOR PRESIDENT VISITS IN NORTH PLATTE.

A good sized crowd heard Governor Cox speak from the rear of his train yesterday morning at nine o'clock. The train was on time and the Governor appeared as the crowd gathered about the rear car. After some complimentary remarks about the state, the Governor gave a few minutes to a discussion of the League of Nations. He said the mothers of this nation were asked to send their boys to the war that war might be abolished and all war ended. "If there is to be any disarmament, it must be by international agreement of the great nations. America through her president agreed to the League of Nations but a political fight was started by a Senatorial oligarchy and this senatorial oligarchy has nominated one of its own members for the Presidency and is attempting to keep the United States out of the League which has already been joined by forty-one nations. It has not proposed any plan which calls for universal disarmament and yet is fighting the only plan which has been proposed."

Governor Cox said he came west to let the people know what he thought about the policy of this nation and he wanted to find out what they thought. He said this was the most important time in the history of the nation for the past fifty years and a time for the highest patriotism. His speech was closed with a compliment for the people who had come out so early in the morning to hear him and after saying good-bye to the audience he entered into a conversation with some of those near him. Inquiring about the crops raised here, their condition and other matters of local interest until the train pulled out.

RHILEY AGAIN WINS THE AUTO RACES AT THE FAIR.

King Rhiley again won the big races at the Lincoln County Fair Friday. He had some competition but managed to get away with the honors and the first place. In the stock Ford 2-mile race, Cecil Lake won first place and North Platte Aircraft Co. second. In the North Platte Special first heat, Rhiley won first, Drake second, O'Brien third; time 11:35. In the second heat, Rhiley won first, Morgan second and O'Brien third; time 11:32 2-5. In the third heat Preitauer won first, Breed second and O'Brien third; time 12:2 2-5. It was in this heat that Noel Bullock passed Rhiley and in recovering the lead Rhiley and Bullock came together putting both out of the running for several laps. The judges finally decided to allow both to compete in the Sweepstakes and five cars started on the twenty-five mile drag—Rhiley, Preitauer, Drake, Breed and Bullock. Only Rhiley and Breed finished, Rhiley easily keeping the lead. In the Lincoln County Special 5-mile race Swanson's car won first with Bullock second and Davison third. In the 10-mile Lincoln County Special Swanson's car again won first, with Bullock second and Miller third. A large crowd was there to see Rhiley beaten and loud talk was heard before the races as to the probable driver who would do it but no one appeared who made him take dust except Bullock and the accident prevented a showdown in that case.

North Platte Light & Power Co. will be host to the members of the Rotary Club and their wives, Wednesday evening, the 29th, at 8 p. m.

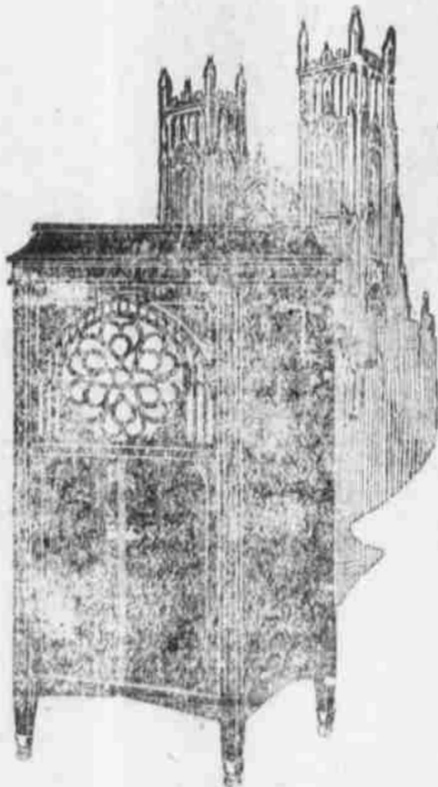
Mrs. E. N. Ogier entertained at a "stag" dinner last evening complimentary to Mr. Ogier whose birth anniversary occurred yesterday.
