EDITORIAL

We are opposed to allowing any citizens of North Platte to openly violate the laws against gambling, immorality and bootlegging. These three forms of vice have been legislated against by majorities which brand them as thoroughly obnoxious. Our citizens must not be protected at any time nor in any place, in carrying on these crimes. Most of us can agree to this. Now if we will not protect our own people when they want to be immoral or bootleg or gamble, much more should we be against allowing outsiders to come into our city and do these things. What is wrong for citizens of North Platte to do here is certainly wrong for outsiders to do here. For this reason we commend Mayor Strelitz in saying to the Carnival Company—"If you come to North Platte you must obey our laws. You cannot come here and do those things openly which we do not allow our own people to do if we know it." If a carnival company will not show here under those terms, we may be sure there is something rotten with that Carnival Company. We don't want it here.
