#### A LETTER FROM MRS. ELEANOR J. BAKER WHO IS VISITING IN ALASKA.

The Tribune is in receipt of a letter from Mrs. Baker, wife of Dr. B. B. Baker, President of the Fidelity Reserve Co. of this city. Mrs. Baker is visiting her son in Alaska and gives her address as St-Johns-in-the-Wilderness, Allakaket, Koyukuk River, via Tanana, Alaska. She writes "I left Seattle June third and arrived here July 21. I was delayed two weeks at Skagway waiting for ice to go out of Lake Le Barge head waters of Yakon and two weeks longer at Tanana waiting for a boat to bring me to mouth of Koyukuk river. I left there July 13th and made my boat at Koyukuk station 16th and arrived here July 21. I was the only woman on the boat. I enjoyed every minute of the trip. The past few nights are the nearest dark ones that I have seen. Until last of July and first week of August one could easily read out of doors at midnight. The boat I came on brought first mail since April which was last train mail. Some sort of boat will bring our next mail in September and then beginning last of October we shall have mail over the trail end of each month until breakup next Spring when we shall have to wait for July or August boat. Only one boat a year now, all our provisions were brought on it. Last night it was 22 degrees F.

There was a flood this year. The first in twenty years. The Indians and Eskimos fled to the hills. Miss Ridgway and the nurse here took tents, stoves, bedding and their trunks and crossed the river before ice went out and went up on high bluffs the last week in May and the flood came after ice went out and the village was covered to depth of 6 ft. in some places. The mission cabin walls have 18 in. water mark. Before going to Bluffs they stored household goods in rafters of church and when I arrived here things were only becoming normal. This is certainly a wilderness. Only Indians and Eskimos. Many of their cabins were washed away. They are away at their fish camps now, but, when they return they must build their cabins. I hope I have not tired you with this but it is all so wonderful and I could write pages about what I have seen and heard of conditions here. I shall be so glad to see The Tribune and I shall hope to hear good news of the Community Chorus.
