SYNOD SESSIONS ARE HELD.

The opening session of the Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Nebraska was held in the First Lutheran Church here Wednesday morning. After the Holy Communion, Rev. C. H. B. Lewis of Emerson, Nebr., delivered the Synodical Sermon on the subject "The Unused Power of the Church." At eight p. m. that evening the Home Missionary Program was given, the general topic being "The Undeveloped Fields in Nebraska." Addresses were given by Rev. W. T. Kahse, Synodical Missionary-Secretary, Rev. W. I. Guss, President of the Synodical Home Missionary Board and Dr. C. B. Harmon of Grand Island.

All day Thursday the delegates and visitors took up the business matters of the Nebraska Synod. At 8 o'clock Rev. George Rann and Rev. E. C. Mortensen were ordained, the ordination sermon being given by Rev. G. B. Weaver of Beatrice. The business session will continue during today and tonight if necessary to finish what business comes up.

About one hundred and twenty-five delegates are present, including those to the State meetings of the Lutheran Brotherhood and the Woman's Missionary Society. The choir of the local church is rendering special music for these meetings.
