STORE IN NEW LOCATION

E. T. TRAMP & SONS MOVE TO NEW HOME ON DEWEY STREET.

The firm of E. T. Tramp & Sons has moved its Ready-To-Wear Department from Front Street to 516 Dewey St. consolidating with the Shoe Department in its own building. About a year ago the size of the business and the ending of certain leases brought the matter of a new location before this firm and in the end the building then occupied by the Gummere-Dent and the Stone Drug Stores was purchased by the Tramp interests. Some months ago the south room was vacated and the Shoe Department took possession. With the removal of the Stone Drug Co. to the McDonald Bank Building, the alteration of the north room started and during the following weeks workmen were busy in remodeling this room and installing the furniture. Moving was accomplished the first of the week. An arch between the two rooms united under one management and under its own roof the two departments of the business. The south room is in oak while the other room has a mahogany finish. The wall cases will be covered with glass which will protect the merchandise from dust and dirt. A French room is provided for customers looking for party dresses. Here the customer and the sales lady can retire to examine and discuss the goods to be purchased. Mirrors, comfortable chairs and suitable rugs will add to the attractiveness of this room. The fitting department and the alteration department are located at the rear of the store and will be complete in every detail. Special attention has been given to the floor coverings, the electric lighting and the decoration of the walls throughout the building. A new plate glass front for the two rooms has been ordered but delays at the manufacturing plant and in transportation make it uncertain when this new front will be installed. E. T. Tramp has been one of the up-to-date merchants of North Platte for a number of years. Sometime ago he associated his two sons, Herbert F. and Arthur F., with him in the business, the boys taking charge of the shoe department while he looked after the Ready-To-Wear himself. With the location and equipment now enjoyed and the reputation of the firm for square dealing, E. T. Tramp & Sons will now take a place among the big mercantile establishments of North Platte.
