EDITORIAL.

Citizens may not know the real facts about the water system in North Platte but if anyone wants to know the condition of things, he should get the information before the election next Tuesday. We have elected our representatives to the Council and it is their business to know all about this department of the city government. Ask your Councilman about it. He will tell you to vote for the bonds. He will tell you that the water rates is just sufficient to pay serious. There is just one pump between the present condition and a complete shutdown of the plant. Unsanitary conditions prevail in some parts of the city because the residents of those parts do not have city water and cannot be served until the mains are extended. In other parts, the service is poor because of too small mains. The fire station needs attention. The income from the present water rates is just sufficient to pay the running expenses. With the decline in prices of coal and materials, a different condition will exist. Until then, there does not seem to be any other way of meeting the emergency, except to give the Mayor and Council added funds for improvements and repairs. The only way to get these funds is by issuing bonds. We should get back of the city government and vote these bonds by a majority that will satisfy purchasers that the people of North Platte are behind these bonds. Then they will sell and work can be commenced that will place us in better shape for next season. Remember to vote for the bonds Tuesday, Oct. 19th.

For the first time in the history of North Platte High School a football team has gone out of town to play a game and is accompanied by its own band. The Cadet Band, forty strong, boarded the early train yesterday morning and will furnish the spirit that is expected to bring victory to the team. It was a big undertaking to carry the band on this trip but when the pupils and teachers unite on a proposition it cannot be too big to be done. We commend the spirit reserving our approval of the propriety of such a trip until we learn the effects on the boys and on the school.
