Editor of The Tribune:

How many fathers and mothers in North Platte, know that their children, both boys and girls, usually in the teens are facing the penitentiary one or two nights every week. Section 8643 of the Statutes of this State in part follows:

"Whoever wilfully, and forcibly, breaks and enter into any dwelling house, office, public building, or other private building, etc., with intent to rob, or commit any felony, or with intent to steal property of any value, shall be punished by imprisonment in the penitentiary not more than ten years nor less than one year, etc."

Last Monday night boys of this age, forcibly broke into two homes in North Platte, one in the east and one in the west end of town for the purpose of robbery. In one case they succeeded and took refreshments intended for guests in the home. They may have thought this was mere sport, but it was a crime. This class of crimes has been systematically carried on in North Platte for sometime and bunches of these boys and girls go about where they know parties are being held and commit these robberies. They violate the law above quoted and can be put in the penitentiary upon conviction.

People generally know who compose these parties. On one occasion these robbers were shot at. People under the law have the right to protect their own homes which are sacred to them.

Will the parents of these children waks up and control them or will it go so far that some of them land in the penitentiary, or are injured or killed, while committing this crime? Tho these boys and girls may look upon this as sport, are they not making an elegant start to become professional thieves and robbers when they are grown up. Their work even now is skillful and they adopt ruses to entice the hosts away from the refreshments which have been prepared for the party, while they break in and steal this property. Will this conduct tend to make good citizens of these boys and girls?
