WEDDING OF POPULAR NORTH PLATTE YOUNG PEOPLE.

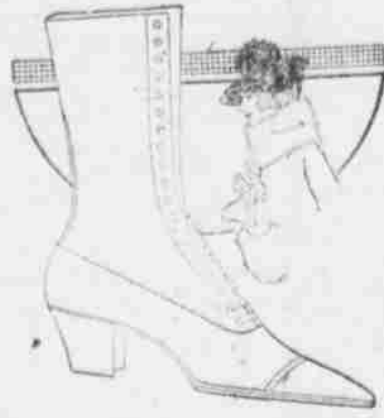

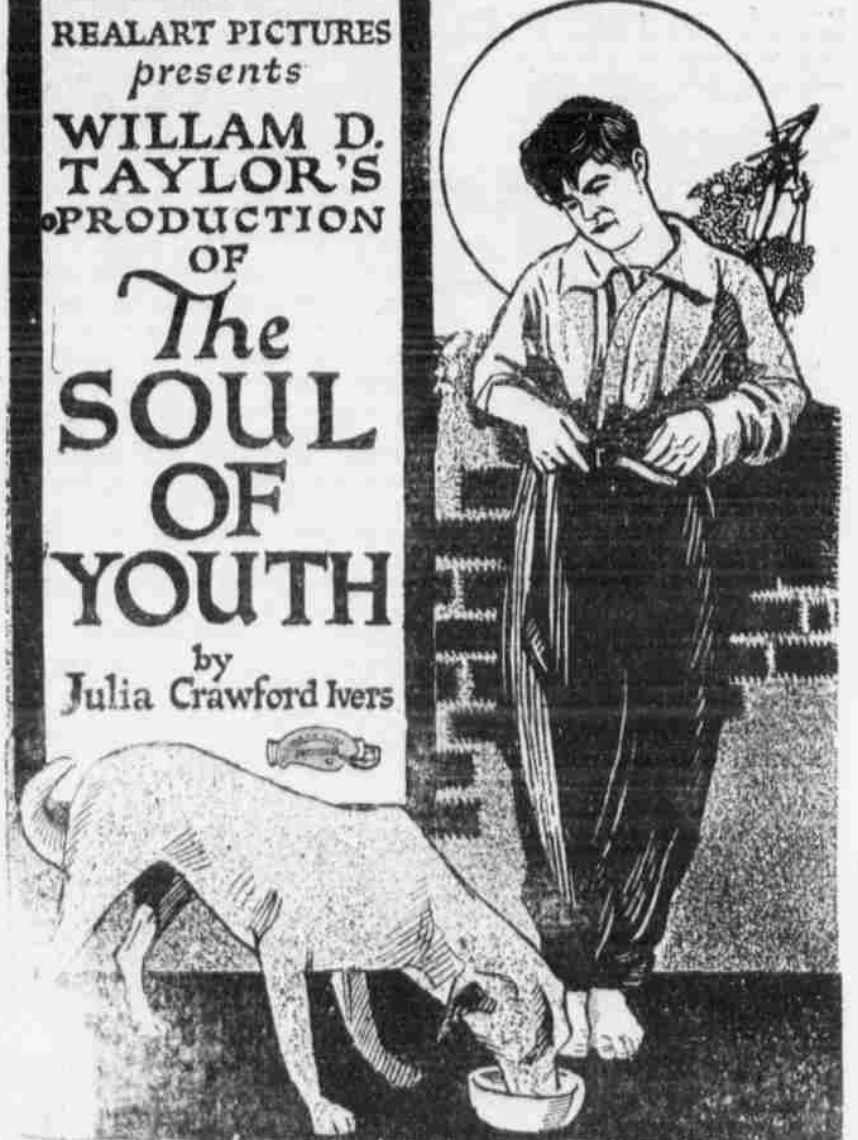
