TO THE VOTERS OF THE 25TH SENATORIAL DISTRICT.

My attention has been called to the fact that some who have had personal differences with me are again indulging in their usual roar-back methods on the eve of this election.

I refer to the vicious false article that appeared in last week's issue of the non-partisan league paper. The fact that the article was unsigned places the stamp of falsehood upon it. It was false, and the Editor of their paper knew it. He knows that ninety percent of the stock of the Higgins Packing Company is owned by farmers; that ten of the fifteen members of its Board of Directors are farmers; that I was elected President by the farmer members of that Board; that it is practically an independent co-operative farmer's company struggling against the big packers. That Editor knows that he refused to buy meats for his store here in North Platte from our farmers packing company but buys from Armour. My record shows that I favored and worked for all of the co-operative farm legislation passed by the last legislature, and that I wrote the amendment to the law that permitted the farmers organizations to have a seat in the Omaha Grain Exchange, and that I fought for this bill and helped its passage by the Senate against the fight of the large grain interests.

My investments are largely in western Nebraska real estate, and the success of the farmers means my success. My record in the Nebraska legislature is an open book. The trouble with the people who make the attack comes because I do not subscribe to the socialist and communist doctrines of Mr. Townley as a cure-all for the present dishonesty in distribution, and because I refuse to place my resignation as Senator in the hands of that machine to file with the Secretary of State if I should not vote the way the machine desires. This is one of the requirements of the non-partisan league. The resignation of its candidates are in the hands of its machine.

The statement that our company refuses to buy from the Farmer's Union is false. We are buying both produce and stock. During the past three

months The Higgins Packing Co. has bought eggs aggregating \$4500 from the Farmer's Union and live stock as late as Tuesday of this week.

If I represent this District in the next Senate I will vote on every question in accordance with what my conscience tells me is for the best interests of western Nebraska, and no organization will have a club over my head in the form of a resignation to be filed the minute I fail to obey the orders of the caucus of leaders, not members of the legislature, held the night before. Such a system of class legislation is damnable and un-American. It strikes at the foundation principles underlying American institutions. If we permitted it the stable principals established by the Pilgrims in 1629 will be destroyed, and we will be fast going the road

traveled by the Greeks and the Romans.

Voters, I stand on my record.
