## FORAGE POISONING

### SUPERINTENDENT SNYDER TELLS OF DISCOVERY INTERESTING TO CATTLEMEN.

In the following article Superintendent Snyder of the Experimental Substation has written in an interesting and easily understood manner the chief facts contained in a rather technical bulletin on "Forage Poisoning" issued as Extension circular No. 38 of the University of Illinois.

According to this circular, the cause of many diseases among farm animals due to forage poisoning has been traced to an organism or very closely related group of organisms which the scientists call *Bacillus Botulinus*. This is the organism which causes poisoning from eating spoiled meat or vegetables or olives. The food may appear wholesome and yet be very poisonous. There is no way of determining the condition of the food except in the laboratory or by feeding it to animals. The poison may be present in practically any kind of food. Although "cornstalk" poisoning was not mentioned in the circular it is probable that it would be placed in this class.

The toxin is developed on the food rather than after the food has been taken into the body. In this respect the poison is like strychnine or arsenic. It is independent in its action, of the organisms that produce it. The poison is usually taken into the body with food or water although it may enter through an injury. It is very virulent. The tasting of contaminated vegetables has been fatal to man in some instances. One drop of a laboratory sample injected under the skin of a thousand pound horse has proven fatal.

Much has been accomplished in preventing and overcoming the effects of the poison by the use of serum. It is doubtful however, if this treatment has yet reached a stage of development where it is practicable for the ranchman, though in severe attacks it would be worth trying. The chief remedy is a complete change of feed, new pastures or new forage. This is not a new procedure as it is now usual for the stockman to change all the conditions rather than guess

at the specific source of the trouble. It is recommended that infected hay or grain be spread to the air and sunlight and if possible washed with water.

It is gratifying to learn that the Experiment Stations are seriously busy on these problems. Nebraskans take pride in the knowledge that our own Station at Lincoln has one of the most up-to-date plants for this work and one of the safest, soundest and most thorough men in charge of the plant. Dr. VanEs may not startle us with sensational reports of wonderful discoveries but he will give to the live stock men of Nebraska the results of careful, conscientious, scientific effort. He may not give us much for nature holds her secrets mighty close, but whatever he gives us will be fact, not fiction.
