 Editor Tribune:
 Just a word in regard to the main objections of the Republican Party to the League of Nations, namely the Monroe Doctrine and Article X. All of the republics of South America except Mexico have joined the League whereby they agree among themselves and with more than thirty other nations of the world to protect the integrity of their respective borders against invasion. It is self-evident there that the burden of doing this protecting of their territory by the United States in accordance with the Monroe Doctrine, is lessened. Our own valiant Republican friends are clawing the air for a chance to do it alone by scrapping the League.
 Referring to Article X, no decision of the Council of the League advising us to go to war can be rendered without a unanimous vote. We can therefore refuse to accept even a moral obligation to declare war by simply instructing our representative to vote no if in our judgment we are covering our rights and the rights of small nations by doing so. Should our representative betray his trust, which is unthinkable, it would be an immoral act which we could not be morally bound to respect.
