When the call was made for volunteers Mr. Macomber responded on April 17, 1917; enlisted in Company E, 184th Infantry. He went to Camp Cody and was there about nine months, then he went overseas. He was assigned to Co. D, 101st Infantry, 26th Division and was ordered to the front Sept. 7, 1918; was wounded Sept. 12, 1918, one bone of the left arm was shot into during the battle of St. Mihiel. He was in the hospital three months. Mr. Macomber returned to his home and went back to his

farm.
