EXPERIMENTAL TEACHING OF BETTER EGG PRODUCTION METHODS.

Supt. W. P. Snyder hands us the following as an example of what can be done by grading up a flock of Poultry—

In a grading experiment the original flock (Lot 1) had an annual production of 89 eggs per bird. Their offspring by common cockerels (Lot 2) had a three year average of 92 eggs per bird, while offspring by good White Leghorn Cockerels (Lot 3) had a two-year average of 125 eggs per bird. Brothers of pullets in Lot 3 mated to pullets in Flock 2 produced offspring which laid an average of 112 eggs the first year.

FARM BUREAU MEMBERSHIP CAMPAIGN.

The Nebraska Farm Bureau Federation is conducting a campaign to add 45,000 new members. Clay and Seward Counties have already been covered and other counties will be canvassed as fast as arrangements can be perfected. Practically 90 per cent of the farmers so far seen have joined the Farm Bureau. The Farm Bureau is an orderly attempt to solve the economic problems of agriculture. It is constructive in its ideas and objects and it appeals to judgment and not to prejudice. Its organization is county, state and national, benefiting the individual the community, the state and the nation. It stands for the sound and sane cooperation of farmers. No farmer with the welfare of his business at heart can afford to withhold his support from this movement.

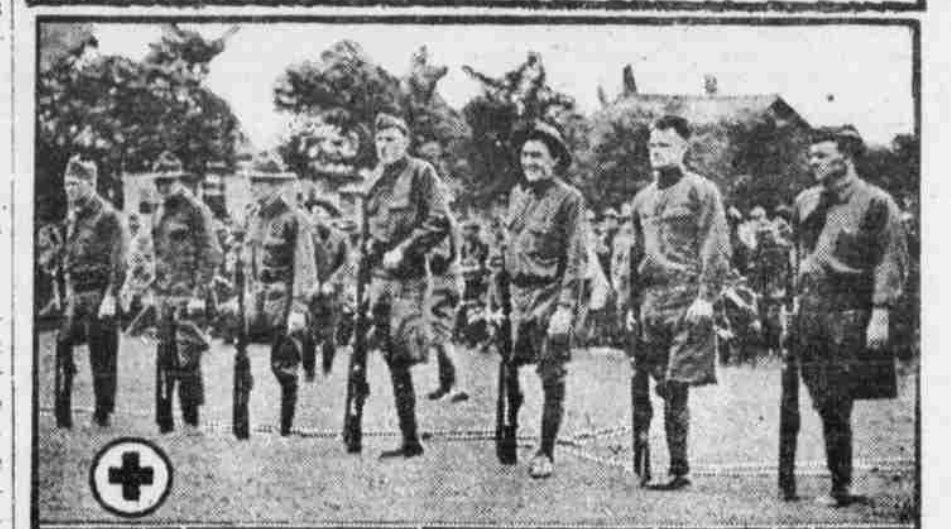
