NEBRASKA WAGES HEALTH DRIVES

State Shows Wonderful Progress in Nursing Service, Especially in Rural Districts.

The Nursing Service of the American Red Cross throughout Nebraska has assumed proportions undreamed of during the last year. A year ago the state had but one Red Cross nurse. Today practically every large city in the state has a large or small staff of trained nurses.

The chapters are paying particular attention to their districts where health work has been neglected. For this reason a large number of classes in nursing instruction are in progress at this time.

The city program and the rural problem for visiting nurses are necessarily different, but the same fundamentals of training are needed to prepare the nurse to cope with them, and the young woman who assumes the responsibility of a rural situation must be exceptionally broad visioned and well prepared, because the service usually is isolated and the individual nurse has to depend upon her own initiative in matters that are exclusively professional.

Great Task Ahead.

The Nursing Service has a great work to perform in Nebraska. Despite the fact that work along this line has been neglected, the Red Cross chapters are rallying to the cause and intend to "carry on."

An example of the excellent work the Nursing Service is doing was clearly demonstrated recently during the school inspection in one of the rural schools. The nurse, in her examination found that the school of 265 pupils did not have one normal child. She immediately called a meeting of the parents and informed them as to the serious condition. The children also were lectured on health essentials. This nurse will, from time to time, receive a report of the children's health and will follow up her work throughout the year.

Teaches Many Subjects.

The examination of the school children is just one of the important phases of the nurse's work. She conducts classes in home hygiene and malnutrition; she aids in the establishing of health centers; she instructs volunteer workers and organizes community work—in all she is the teacher.

In many of the smaller districts of Nebraska where the Red Cross chapters have been unable to carry on the task through lack of workers, a number of the chapters have combined their interests and work under one Red Cross chapter. This was true in the community around Knox county, where eight Red Cross chapters consolidated and now work under one chapter—the Knox County chapter.

Everywhere in Nebraska the greatest interest is being manifested in the work for health and the chapters are furnishing recreational and other community needs.

JUNIOR RED CROSS BUSY IN NEBRASKA

With the opening of school this term in Nebraska the Junior Red Cross activities have begun with enthusiasm. The year's program presented many new features for the boys and girls, and they entered upon it with revived interest.

Many local projects of service to the schools and to unfortunate children is being stimulated by partial and complete financial reports by the Junior Red Cross. Such projects, except in case of unfortunate children, are involving the betterment of the schools as a whole and not any special group.

The Junior Red Cross intends to cooperate more than ever with the schools throughout Nebraska this year. In all the communities it is working with the school authorities in carrying on regular class room activities.

Of course, the boys and girls will help this fall with the community work, as they have in the past. The annual clean-up programs will be aided by the Junior Red Cross, as well as the promotion of health campaigns.
