EDITORIAL.

There has been too much pussyfooting about the gas question in North Platte. What we want is an open hearing on the question. The Gas Company has attempted to get signers to a petition by going to the individual citizen and asking for the signature to an individual petition. The Chamber of Commerce directors have talked the matter over informally but nothing has been done. We have been offered letters on the subject by interested citizens but we have thought best not to get the matter into the paper where it is so apt to be misunderstood. What we want is a face to face discussion of the question upon its merits. We believe the people want to get the facts. The suggestion has been made that both sides be invited to an open hearing under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce. As an inducement to get people to take the time to attend such a hearing, it has been suggested that it be held following a banquet. Other suggestions have been made but nothing has been done. Our interest in the matter is that of the average citizen who is a gas consumer. We do not want the increased rates unless the Gas Company can show that we should pay more. We do not think there should be any court action of any kind until all possible methods have been tried to get the matter settled otherwise. We are looking to the Chamber of Commerce to see that a public hearing is held at which those having reasons for and against the matter should be given a chance to tell what they know. Will we get it?
