> That Hope of Future May Receive Means of Life.

The one optimistic note in the desperate need prevailing through the wartorn areas of eastern Europe is the extraordinary and touching faith of the people in the children. The elder generation has put all its hope and trust in the future of the generation now in its early years. In fact, in many instances it is deliberately sacrificing itself for the children, the Europe of tomorrow.

In the war-rayaged districts supplies necessary for maintenance of institutions are lacking, but it has been noted that always the request for outside aid emphasises the needs of the orphanages. How marked is this inclination was indicated by the fact that one district of Poland the authoritles, appealing to an American relief organization for assistance, asked assistance for only one military hospital, four general hospitals and twenty orphanages.


