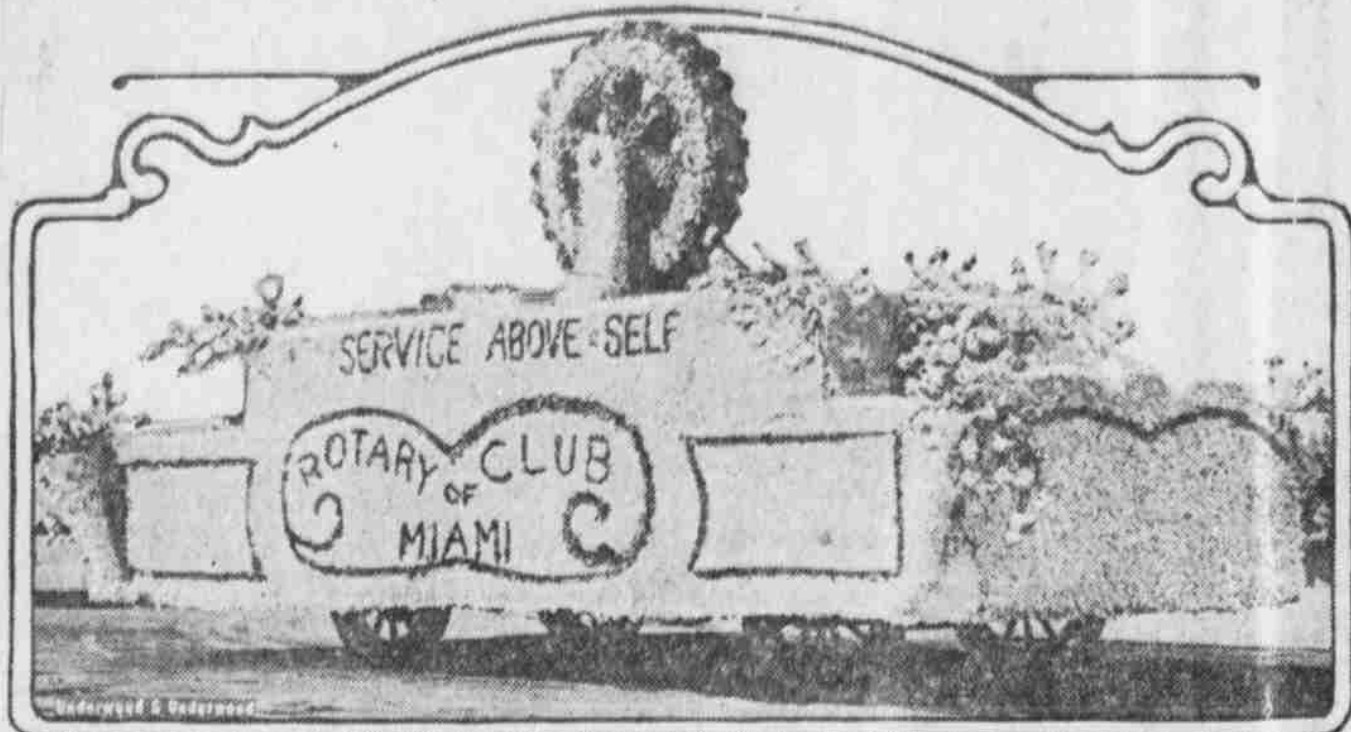
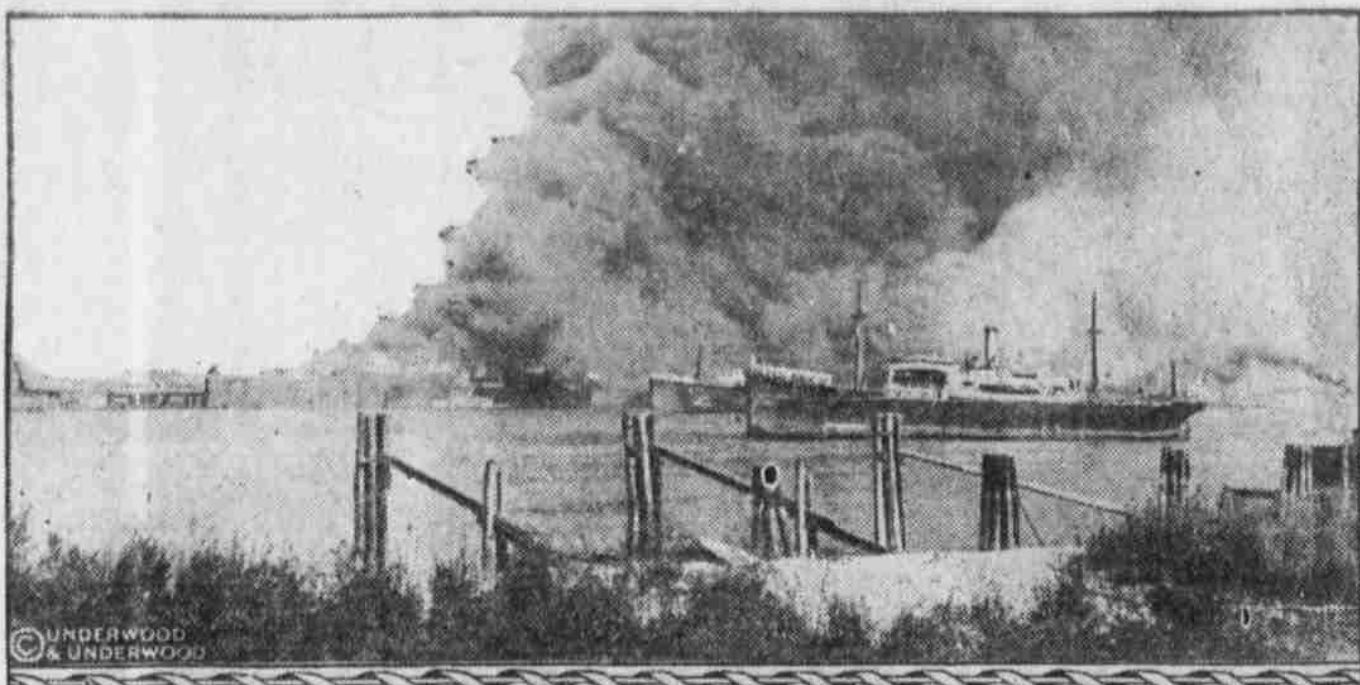


Feature of the Flower Parade at Miami

Dry Docks and Vessels Burn at New Orleans



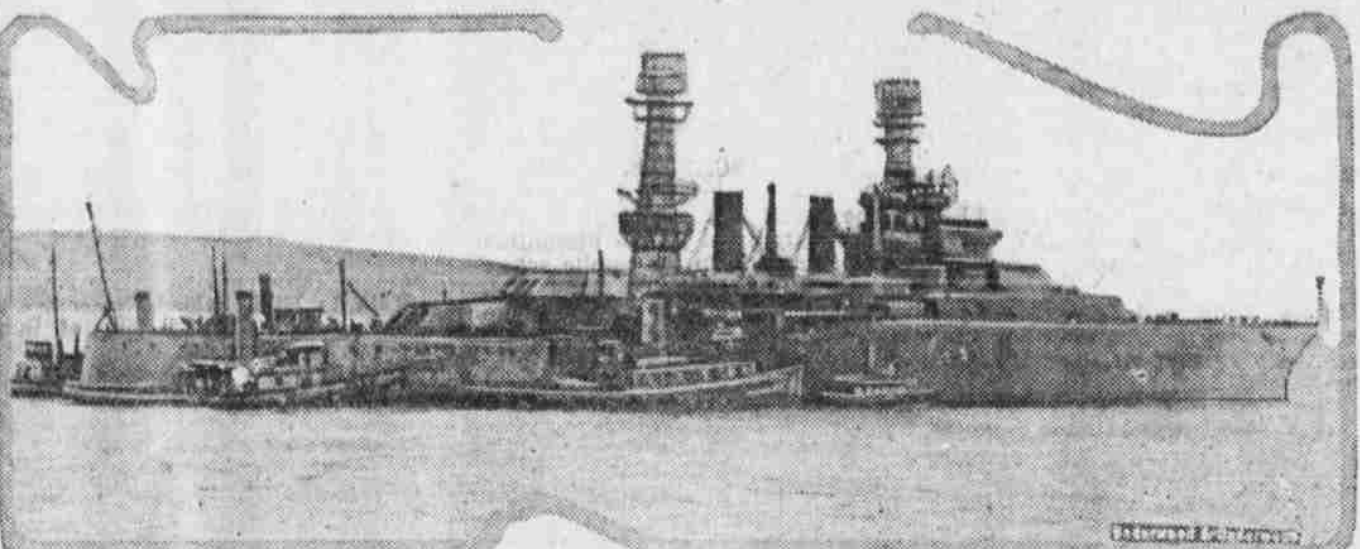
