The normal tax rate for 1920 is the same as for 1919-4 per cent on the first \$4000 of net income above the exemption and 8 per cent on the remaining net income. This applies to every citizen and resident of the United States normal tax a surtax is imposed upon net incomes in excess of \$5000.

Full instructions for making out rerns are contained on the forms, copof which may be obtained from collectors of internal revenue. Persons whose net income for 1920 was \$5000 or less should use Form 1040A. Those with incomes in excess of \$5000
