EDITORIAL.

With this issue we begin a rearrangement of the pages of The Tribune. Look on the second and third pages for local news. We expect to carry the continued story and the latest news of the nation and state on the ready print pages just as was done formerly but we want to give the first pages of The Tribune to the affairs of North Platte and Lincoln County. We trust our patrons will like the new arrangement.

There is one person in each newspaper office who is called the editor. It is his duty to edit the matter that goes into the paper. The Tribune has such a person and he is doing his best to live up to this idea. He does not claim to be more capable than anyone else but he has the duty and with it goes the responsibility. When a news item or a contribution comes to his desk it must be edited. He cuts it down or expands it. He increases the importance of one part and diminishes that of another. He eliminates flowery language and changes slangy or stale expressions. His style must be consistent. Many articles repeat important parts when it is not by repetition but by emphasis that the importance of any part of the article is shown. It is just as important that one editor should edit the writings of another editor as that he should edit those of anyone else. This is to secure uniformity of style. We believe our contributors will appreciate this position and not take personal offense when we edit their manuscripts.

Last week we gave out testimony to the good work which is being done and which has been done by some of the men and women of this community in helping the boys and girls to become better and to enjoy life more intensely. We did not mention the men and women who are setting a bad example by living riotous lives. We did not miss them thoughtlessly. 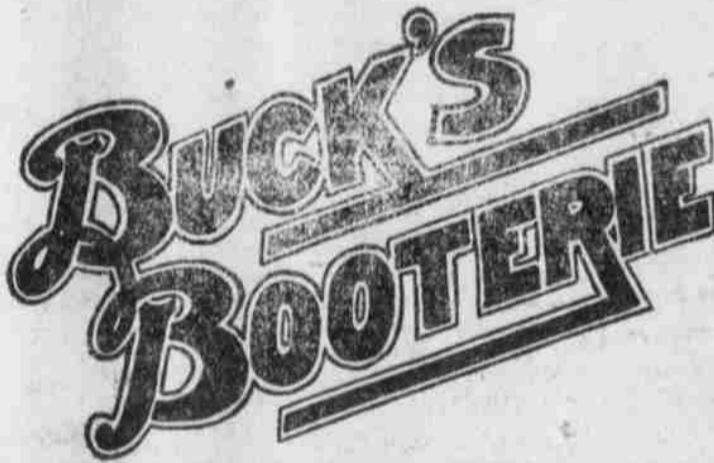
