The orgie of individual spending has been equalled, if not surpassed, during the two year period by the disposition of the public to plunge into debt, according to the records of the state auditor's office. Bonds of municipalities have been registered in amount of \$22,124,089, which is nearly three times as much as for the preceding biennium which was counted monumental in comparison with preceding years. These mortgages on future Nebraska generations carry a higher average interest rate than ever before and a great many of the bonds have suffered substantial discounts in their frenzy to convert themselves into checking accounts. Country precincts alone show a decrease while cities and towns have apparently stayed awake nights devising novel

ways of getting into debt.
