

PUBLIC WELFARE ASSOCIATION NOT FOR SUPPRESSION BUT TO HELP.

The following statement has been prepared by the Publicity Committee of the Public Welfare Association as one of a number of statements which will tend to put the Association in the right light before the people. The statement follows:

Some of the citizens seem to have the erroneous impression that this is an association of suppression, to close up the dances and picture shows. This is a mistaken idea as the Public Welfare Association is for the help of the community, and not to curtail and suppress.

When the Public Welfare Association tells the dance manager how he must conduct his dance, it is for the protection of the boys and girls who go. It is the aim of the Public Welfare Association to help and promote, and not to deprive the public of the amusements they wish. The desire of the Welfare Association is to protect the public from the things that have a tendency to lessen the standard of these amusements.

The Public Welfare Association has promoted the swimming pool proposition and we are now assured of a swimming pool second to none in the state, with sanitary drainage and a gravel beach equal to the seashore. Plans are being made for bathhouses, also a pavilion where lunches can be eaten. Particular plans have been made in order to secure sanitation and drainage, and this, together with the lack of finances has delayed its completion. But this coming summer will see the swimming pool ready for use.

ANOTHER OLD SETTLER ANSWERS THE LAST CALL SUNDAY.

Willads Hansen, for about thirty-five years janitor and custodian at the Central High School here, died at a local hospital Sunday following a few days of serious illness. Mr. Hansen was born in Denmark, April 15, 1855. He married there in 1878 and shortly afterward came to this country, arriving at North Platte in 1882. He has lived here continuously since that date. He operated a ranch near here for a short time and then came to the city where he worked as a plumber and repairer until he gave up all other occupation to give his full time to the Board of Education. He became one of the trusted employees of the school and has the acquaintance of every boy and girl who has attended the Central building and the building that was torn down to make room for the present structure.

He leaves a sister who lives in Iowa a niece Miss Thea Hansen and a nephew, Henry Hansen, both of this city. The funeral will be held from his home at 314 East Fifth Street at 2:30 this afternoon. Interment will be in the North Platte cemetery beside his wife who left him only a few months ago.

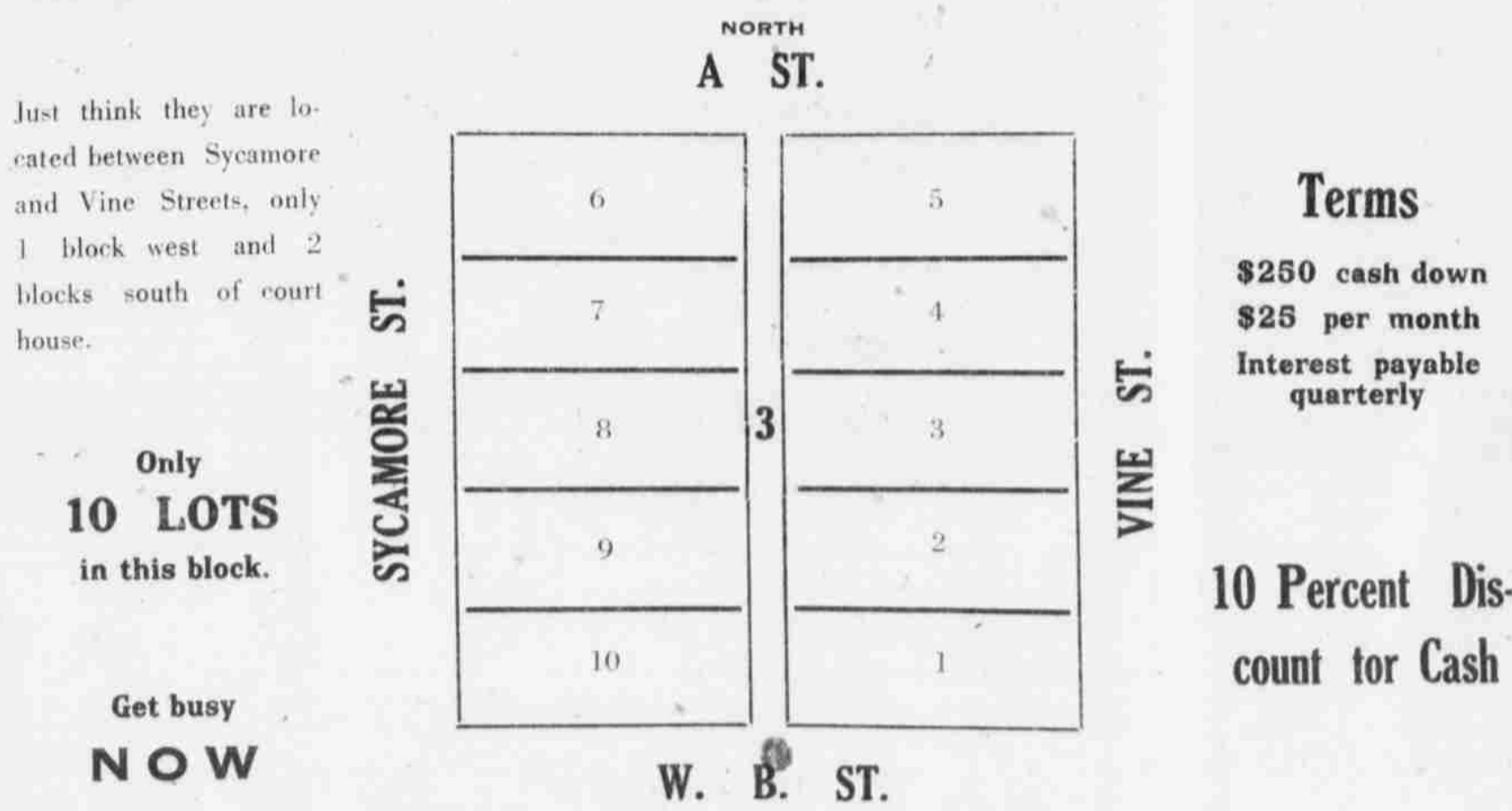
