North Platte, Neb., Jan. 23, 1921.
Dear Taxpayer:—
Do you know that the Welfare Association is advocating the erection of an up to date County Hospital and Detention Home, at North Platte, where the county's dependent helpless sick may be properly cared for, and where delinquent children may find a suitable temporary home?
