C. J. Perkins left Monday evening for Dodgeville, Wisconsin, where he will visit his brother for two weeks.


Virgil Lewis, who has been off duty at the Leader for the past few days, resumed his duties Thursday morning.

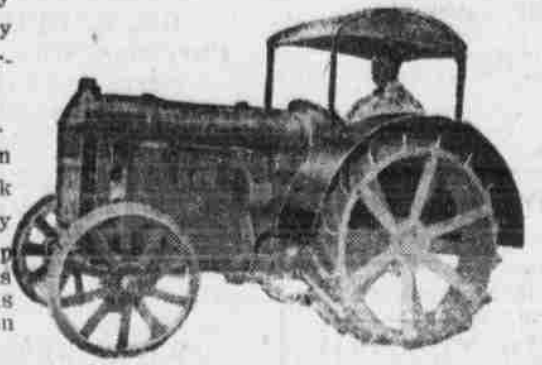
